1. CALL TO ORDER

Chairwoman Conwell called the meeting to order at 1:02 p.m.

2. ROLL CALL

Ms. Conwell asked Assistant Deputy Clerk Georgakopoulos to call the roll. Committee members Conwell, Sweeney, Stephens and Miller were in attendance and a quorum was determined. Committee member Turner arrived after the roll call was taken.

3. PUBLIC COMMENT

Loh addressed the Committee regarding the various housing challenges and available resources to persons experiencing homelessness.

4. APPROVAL OF MINUTES FROM THE JULY 12, 2023 MEETING

A motion was made by Mr. Sweeney, seconded by Mr. Miller and approved by unanimous vote to approve the minutes from the July 12, 2023 meeting.

5. MATTERS REFERRED TO COMMITTEE

a) R2023-0218: A Resolution authorizing an amendment to a master contract with various providers for emergency assistance services for the period 9/1/2021 – 8/31/2023, to extend the time period to 8/31/2024 and for additional funds in the total amount not-to-exceed \$1,575,000.00; authorizing the County Executive to execute the amendment and all other documents consistent with this Resolution; and declaring the necessity that this Resolution become immediately effective:

Discussion ensued.

On a motion by Ms. Stephens with a second by Ms. Turner, Resolution No. R2023-0218 was considered and approved by unanimous vote to be referred to the full Council agenda with a recommendation for passage under second reading suspension of the rules.

Ms. Melissa Sirak, Director for the Office of Homeless Services; Ms. Elaine Gimmel, Executive Director and Ms. Rachella Tillman, Director of Property Management and Maintenance for Emerald Development & Economic Network, Inc.; Ms. Cynthia Dailey, Senior Shelter Director for the Young Women's Christian Association (YWCA); Ms. Jennifer Harrison, Director of Housing and Employment for Mental Health Services for Homeless Persons, Inc dba FrontLine Services; and Mr. Mitch Wasserman, Grants Manager for Front Steps Housing & Services, Inc, addressed the Committee regarding Resolution No. R2023-0219. Discussion ensued.

Committee members asked questions of Ms. Sirak, Ms. Gimmel, Ms. Tillman, Ms. Dailey, Ms. Harrison and Mr. Wasserman pertaining to the item, which they answered accordingly.

On a motion by Ms. Stephens with a second by Ms. Turner, Resolution No. R2023-0219 was considered and approved by unanimous vote to be referred to the full Council agenda.

Ms. Stephens amended the prior motion with a second by Ms. Turner, and was approved by unanimous vote, as amended, to include a recommendation for passage under second reading suspension of the rules.

Ms. Turner requested to have her name added as a co-sponsor to the legislation.

c) R2023-0220: A Resolution authorizing an amendment to Contract No. 3013 with Lutheran Metropolitan Ministry for operations and case management services for a 400-bed Men's Emergency Shelter, located at 2100 Lakeside Avenue, Cleveland, and for facilitation and coordination of overflow shelter services for single adults and families at various locations for the period 1/1/2023 – 8/19/2023, to extend the time period to 12/31/2023 and for additional funds in the total amount not-to-exceed \$1,575,000.00; authorizing the County Executive to execute the amendment and all other

documents consistent with this Resolution; and declaring the necessity that this Resolution become immediately effective.

Ms. Sirak, Ms. Maria Foschia, President and Chief Executive Officer and Mr. Michael Sering, Vice President of Housing & Shelter for Lutheran Metropolitan Ministry, addressed the Committee regarding Resolution No. R2023-0220. Discussion ensued.

Committee members asked questions of Ms. Sirak, Ms. Foschia and Mr. Sering pertaining to the item, which they answered accordingly.

On a motion by Ms. Stephens with a second by Ms. Turner, Resolution No. R2023-0220 was considered and approved by unanimous vote to be referred to the full Council agenda with a recommendation for passage under second reading suspension of the rules.

6. MISCELLANEOUS BUSINESS

Chairwoman Conwell announced that The MetroHealth System invited primarily female elected officials, community partners and medical professionals to host the 2023 Multicultural Women's Health Fair & Empowerment Expo that will be held on September 30^{th.} Ms. Conwell said a meeting was held to discuss how to best organize and to boost attendance to ensure a successful event and also met with County staff to discuss ways to encourage attendance from County employees; and urged her colleagues to contact Michele Pomerantz at MetroHealth, if they have any ideas or suggestions regarding the event.

Mr. Sweeney recognized Mr. Cortes for his efforts to process and submit the contracts for consideration in a timely manner.

7. ADJOURNMENT

With no further business to discuss, Chairwoman Conwell adjourned the meeting at 1:42 p.m., without objection.

WHEREAS, Cuyahoga County received \$239,898,257 from the Federal Government through the American Rescue Plan Act ("ARPA"); and

WHEREAS, Cuyahoga County calculated 100% of the ARPA dollars as loss revenue under the U.S. Department of the Treasury Final Rule; and

WHEREAS, since all the ARPA dollars have been calculated as loss revenue, the ARPA dollars have been deposited in the County's General Fund; and

WHEREAS, the County Executive and County Council have authorized \$86 million of the ARPA dollars for community grants to benefit the residents of Cuyahoga County (the "ARPA Community Grant Fund"); and

WHEREAS, of the \$86 million for community grants, \$66 million have been encumbered for equal distribution to each County Council District; and

WHEREAS, the Cuyahoga County Council desires to provide funding from the District 7 ARPA Community Grant Fund in the amount of \$250,000 to Mobile Medl for the purpose of expanding Medworks Oral Health and Dental Care in Cleveland; and

WHEREAS, Mobile Med1 estimates approximately 300 people will be served annually through this award; and

WHEREAS, Mobile Med1 estimates approximately 8 permanent and temporary jobs will be created or retained through this project; and

WHEREAS, Mobile Med1 estimates the total cost of the project is \$324,150; and

WHEREAS, Mobile Med1 indicates the other funding source(s) for this project includes:

- A. \$40,000 from Delta Dental;
- B. \$45,000 from the PCP & Ponsky Family;
- C. \$15,000 from the Thatcher Family Fund;
- D. \$7,500 from the Parker Hannifin Foundation; and

WHEREAS, Mobile Med1 is estimating the start date of the project will be October 2023 and the project will be completed by December 2026; and

WHEREAS, Mobile Med1 requested \$250,000 from the District 7 ARPA Community Grant Fund to complete this project; and

WHEREAS, the Cuyahoga County Council desires to provide funding in the amount of \$250,000 to the Mobile Med1 to ensure this project is completed; and

WHEREAS, this Council by a vote of at least eight (8) members determines that it is necessary that this Resolution become immediately effective in order that critical services provided by Cuyahoga County can continue to provide for the usually, daily operations of the County.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF CUYAHOGA COUNTY, OHIO:

- **SECTION 1.** That the Cuyahoga County Council hereby awards a not-to-exceed amount of \$250,000 to Mobile Med1 from the General Fund made available by the American Rescue Plan Act revenue replacement provision for the purpose of expanding Medworks Oral Health and Dental Care in Cleveland.
- **SECTION 2.** If any specific appropriation is necessary to effectuate this agreement, the Director of the Office of Budget and Management is authorized to submit the requisite documentation to financial reporting to journalize the appropriation.
- **SECTION 3.** That the County Council staff is authorized to prepare all documents to effectuate said award.
- **SECTION 4.** That the County Executive is authorized to execute all necessary agreements and documents consistent with said award and this Resolution.
- **SECTION 5.** If requested or necessary, the Agency of the Inspector General or Department of Internal Audit is authorized to investigate, audit, or review any part of this award.

SECTION 6. To the extent that any exemptions are necessary under the County Code and contracting procedures, they shall be deemed approved by the adoption of this Resolution.

SECTION 7. It is necessary that this Resolution become immediately effective for the usual daily operation of the County; the preservation of public peace, health or safety in the County; and any additional reasons set forth in the preamble. Provided that this Resolution receives the affirmative vote of at least eight members of Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon the earliest occurrence of any of the following: (1) its approval by the County Executive through signature, (2) the expiration of the time during which it may be disapproved by the County Executive under Section 3.10(6) of the Cuyahoga County Charter, or (3) its passage by at least eight members of Council after disapproval pursuant to Section 3.10(7) of the Cuyahoga County Charter. Otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

SECTION 8. It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the adoption of this Resolution were adopted in an open meeting of the Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

REQUEST DESCRIPTION (include the project name, a description of the project, why the project is important or needed, and timeline of milestones/tracking of the project):

Expansion of Medworks Oral Health and Dental Care in Cleveland

For nearly 15 years, Medworks has been bringing FREE high quality and accessible oral and dental health care and education to Cleveland residents. For the past 6 consecutive years (with the exclusion of 2020 & 2021), Medworks has hosted a large scale 2- day Oral Health and Dental Clinic at the Huntington Convention Center. This clinic engages nearly 500 dental, medical and community volunteers to provide x-rays, cleanings, extractions, fillings, sealants for children and partials to an average of 900 uninsured and under-insured adults and children. Each patient meets with a Medworks Certified Application Navigator (CAN) after their services. CANs offer insurance enrollment, assist with finding a medical home, follow up care, and wrap around services. Additional medical services include vision exams and free prescription eyeglasses, podiatry, mental health services, vaccines and more. A resource fair offers an opportunity for patients to connect with other safety net providers who like Medworks address Social Determinants of Health, including job training, placement and retention, early education, and food insecurity.

Participating volunteers in the oral health field receive CEU's. Local universities and colleges (Case Western Reserve & Tri-C) are partners in engaging students in related fields, providing valuable firsthand experience under the guidance of seasoned professionals in the field. Cleveland has been identified as a dental professional shortage area in the Cleveland Clinics Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA). Medworks bolsters student engagement, feeding the pipeline of future dental professionals.

The #1 unmet health need in Northeast Ohio is Oral Health and Dental Care (OSU & OH College of Medicine and Government Resource Center).

"Among working-age US adults, over 40% of low-income and non-Hispanic Black adults have untreated tooth decay. Untreated oral disease has a large impact on quality of life and productivity." (Centers for Disease Control and Prevention)

Over 50% of Medworks dental patients are persons of color. 75% of patients reside in Cleveland and its first ring suburbs where health disparities are greatest. When left untreated, dental disease has grave consequences on overall health.

"Recent research has indicated possible associations between chronic oral infections and diabetes, heart and lung disease, stroke, and low birthweight or premature births. In other words, oral health refers to the health of our mouth and, ultimately, supports and reflects the health of the entire body." (Public Health Report)

Untreated oral health is directly linked to the most frequently occurring chronic diseases in adults living in Cleveland. It can lead to emergency room visits, where oral health needs are not resolved. Dental Pain is in the top 2 diagnosis for opioid prescriptions in ER's (CDC). These patients are bound to return to the emergency room more than once for the same issue. Patients who do have access to dental providers through insurance plans report excessive waits, inconsistent services, and unmanageable co-pays.

Given the significance of oral health and dental care, and evidence of need, Medworks would like to expand its dental services, offering dental clinics on a quarterly basis. The current large scale dental clinic cannot be replicated quarterly due to the high cost of equipment rental and labor. Medworks wishes to purchase 25 dental chairs, portable dental units (instruments/air compressor/water) and autoclaves (sanitation stations) so that it can bring dental care to those in need throughout the year, without reoccurring high rental costs. (Rental and labor costs for the annual 2-day dental clinic exceed \$45,000.)

Objectives

- Provide episodic and preventative quality oral health and dental care to 1500+ residents annually, positively impacting overall health and reducing incidence of disease
- Shift regular oral hygiene patterns through education and access and assistance with health insurance enrollment and connection with dentalcare homes
- Reduce barriers of access, including trust, with a regularly scheduled mobile dental clinic-located in neighborhoods where need is greatest

Adding quarterly dental clinics to Medworks annual dental clinic will increase the number of those served on an annual basis. To bring this care to neighborhoods where health disparities are greatest, Medworks will partner with local FQHC's, Community Health Centers and other entities to set up its mobile equipment. Medworks will manage the transportation, service, and storage of all dental equipment. Medworks staff will facilitate and execute quarterly dental clinics, locating hosts, volunteer dental and medical professionals, and volunteer community members who act as patient guides, operate registration, assist with check-out, produce distribution etc.

The Medworks internal team will broadly advertise these quarterly clinics through its already established vast network of mission ambassadors. Mission ambassadors are partners who share a target population with Medworks and promote its clinics and services free of charge.

Medworks dental lead and board member, Dr. Roger Hess will work with the Medworks team to ensure service quality, train other volunteer dental professionals and facilitate clinics. Dr. Hess is an established leader in the field of dentistry and has directed each of Medworks dental clinics to date. He actively recruits volunteers and promotes opportunities for professional practice and receiving services with Medworks. He has earned multiple accolades for his work in the community, including Volunteer Dentist of the Year in 2022-a statewide distinction.

Medworks tracks its impact. In November of 2022, Medworks took live a CRM, SalesForce. For each person that Medworks delivers a service to, whether a medical service or health insurance enrollment, a patient profile is created. These patient profiles allow Medworks to track the total number of patients served, services delivered, follow-up care needed, neighborhoods served and any demographic data provided by the patient. All served through Medworks quarterly dental clinics will be entered into Medworks database, thus allowing Medworks to track its efficacy. All patient profiles are confidential.

<u>Timeline of Project</u>

10/2023-Secure climate-controlled storage for dental equipment and place order

11/2023-Hire trained dental equipment maintenance provider, assemble and prep equipment

12/2023-Identify host partners for quarterly dental clinics, establish schedule

Q1/2024-Recruit dental, medical and community volunteers for upcoming clinics, advertise clinics

Q2/2024-Host first Medworks pop up quarterly dental clinic

Q3/2024 Host second quarterly pop-up clinic

Q4/2024 Large scale dental clinic, Huntington Convention Center

Q1/2025 Fourth quarterly dental clinic

Dental Clinics will continue each quarter henceforth.

After each clinic, the Medworks team, along with Dr. Roger Hess will analyze clinic efficacy. Patterns for the type of care needed, partner relationships, number of people served, neighborhoods impacted etc. will be reviewed. Approach to care will be modified based on ongoing reflection, lessons learned, patient satisfaction surveys and community need.

IMPACT OF PROJECT:

Who will be served:

Medworks serves ALL -with unconditional care-no questions asked. It serves Cleveland neighbors who are medically disenfranchised, unhoused, low-income, racial, and ethnic minorities, refugees, the LGBTQ community, those facing reentry, the formerly incarcerated and more. In the second poorest large city in America, with two of the top 15 poorest zip codes and the worst city for Black women and infants, Medworks reaches into medically underserved areas to build trust (trust and race have been deemed barriers to health) and connect individuals with permanent medical homes. Medworks tracks zip codes impacted, reaching 100 zip codes in Northeast Ohio annually. 75% of its patients report zip codes in Cleveland and its first ring suburbs. Its network of dental and medical volunteers works to educate patients and shift selfcare patterns, increasing preventative care and decreasing burdens placed on emergency care facilities. Patients are referred to local FQHC's and Neighborhood Healthcare centers, major medical systems and other community-based organizations who address SDoH. Medworks serves as a safety net to the safety nets, addressing a gap that continues to grow larger.

How many people will be served annually:

In 2022, the first year of providing direct patient services following a 2-year pandemic related hiatus, Medworks provided direct patient care to over 3,500 individuals. Over 5,000 services were delivered (mental health, dental cleanings, extractions, partials, fillings, general health screenings, vision exams, and specialty care including women's health) that included connection with medical homes and wrap around services. An additional 3500+ were referred to partner organizations, connected with medical homes, Medicare, SNAP and childcare. 10,000 impressions were made-sharing important information related to selfcare and resources. In 2023, Medworks is on pace to serve over 5000 individuals with direct patient care and Navigation services through clinics and outreach events.

Medworks currently serves an average of 900 dental patients annually. Adding quarterly dental clinics would allow Medworks to increase its patient reach by 30% in its initial programming year. In the pilot year, Medworks quarterly clinics (Q 1, Q2 & Q3) would reach an additional 300 dental patients. In year two Medworks will scale up to an additional 450 patients and 600 in year three. Medworks annual large scale 2-day clinic will continue in Q4. In the third year of the project Medworks will serve 66% more patients than it is currently serving. This gain will be maintained in subsequent years.

Will low/moderate income people be served; if so how:

Yes, Medworks provides services to those who face barriers to care for a variety of reasons with poverty and income amongst them. Some of its patients are insured but face additional barriers to care (trust, access, transportation, high deductibles) while others are uninsured-because they do not qualify or need support navigating a complicated system to accessing care.

Medworks strategically engages specialists such as Dentists, OBGYNs, Pulmonologists, Cardiologists and Endocrinologists to address the most frequently occurring chronic diseases amongst Cuyahoga Counties medically underserved individuals. Demand exists for Medworks to increase the depth and breadth of its services, increasing access to dental care and oral screenings (the #1 unmet health need in Cleveland) vision, mental health, and specialty care. Patients who struggle to access care are more likely to utilize safety net programs when more than one member of a household can be serviced in a day and multiple services are provided.

Those who struggle to afford dental care, children and adults alike, will be served with complete care. Medworks complete oral health and dental care starts with a base line vitals check with an RN or PA. Dental triage follows medical triage. X-rays are conducted for those who need them. In the case that episodic needs are detected, patients receive extractions and fillings. Cleanings are available, sealants for children and front facing partials. Each patient receives an average of 2.5 dental services.

In 2023, Medworks has shifted to providing more services for the whole family and increasing the breadth of services at each clinic. For example, a March 2023 clinic at Otis Moss Jr. Community Health Center offered, Vision and Prescription Eyeglasses, General Healthcare, Pulmonology, Pediatrics, Mammograms and Covid vaccines. A June 2023 clinic at Care Alliance in the Central neighborhood offered, general health, HIV screening, Covid vaccines, pediatrics, mental health, obstetrics, allergy and asthma and rheumatology.

Medworks quarterly dental clinics will follow this model, integrating vision and other specialty care services.

How does the project fit with the community and with other ongoing projects:

According to the Cleveland Clinics Community Health Needs Assessment (CHNA) for the main campus community (22 of 66 Cuyahoga County zip codes located closest to the main campus) great health disparities exist. The population of these zip codes includes over a half million people of whom are a majority minority, with 20% living below poverty. Approximately 55% are black, 35% white with the remaining 20% Asian, Hispanic, and other. This 2022 CHNA has identified five prioritized health needs for the main campus community. Three of five are directly addressed with Medworks proposal for expanded free mobile dental clinics;

- Access (including transportation, cost and availability of care)
- Chronic Disease Prevention and Management (including available nutritious foods, chronic disease prevention and maintenance, and diabetes)
- Maternal and Child Health (with the most significant warning indicator low birth weight)

Access

When noting access as a prioritized health need, the no. 1 warning indicator is adults who have recently visited a dentist and for older adults the no. 2 warning indicator is adults 65+ with total tooth loss.

Medworks continually seeks host partners who are accessible via public transportation and provides bus passes to those who use public transportation. When possible, clinics are hosted in facilities that are familiar and trusted community anchors. Clinics are typically hosted on Saturdays.

<u>Chronic Disease Prevention and Detection</u>

Untreated oral health is directly linked to the most frequently occurring chronic diseases in adults living in Cleveland. It can lead to emergency room visits, where oral health needs are not resolved. Regular oral health exams are critical for diagnosing gum disease-which when left untreated leads to tooth loss and infections that can enter the blood stream and impact all vital organs.

Through a partnership with the Greater Cleveland Foodbank, each patient leaves with a 10 lb. bag of produce. Maternal and Child Health

The CDC reports that untreated oral health care contributes to low birth weight. Some studies show that mothers with periodontal disease cause more low birth weight babies than mothers who smoke or use alcohol (Offenbacher et al.). Periodontal disease can be detected through regular oral screenings.

Patients who do have access to dental providers through insurance plans report excessive waits, inconsistent services, and unmanageable co-pays. The impact of regular oral health and dental care can be observed through new smiles and increased confidence, but its full implications are unseen, impacting whole body health and even future generations.

If applicable, how many jobs will be created or retained (specify the number for each) and will the jobs be permanent or temporary:

Medworks employs 8 FTE individuals, all of whom will be retained and support this project. The roles that each of these 8 individuals fill are permanent roles that are essential to the project. These roles include an Executive Director, Director of Advancement, Program Director, Navigation Director, Operations Manager, and three Navigators.

The Executive Director will be instrumental in leading the project, the Director of Advancement in securing funding to support the project, the Program Director in facilitating clinics, the Navigation team in connecting patients with wrap around services, health insurance and primary medical homes and the Operations Manager in managing the day-to-day operations of Medworks.

This project will create additional permanent roles. A contractor will be retained to service and supervise the care/storing and transportation of dental equipment and a part-time program coordinator will be added to ensure that newly added dental clinic opportunities meet the full scope of the goals and objectives indicated in this application. A dental consultant (temp) will advise on the purchase and initial storing and care of all equipment.

If applicable, what environmental issues or benefits will there be:

Usage of autoclaves for sterilization allows for high quality reusable instruments to be used eliminating reliance on disposable dental tools.

Direct dental care does reduce emergency room visits-ultimately reducing excessive emergency room medical waste and additional resources such as cost and personnel. Additionally given the lack of oral care specialists on hand in emergency rooms, pharmacological agents are relied upon to provide patient relief. Preventative care reduces reliance on opioids.

Medworks clinics provide multiple services in a day for each patient and often multiple members of one household. This model for care reduces transportation needs, reducing the environmental impact of vehicles and busses. Likewise, providing multiple services in a day minimizes interruptions to work and school.

Centralized care leads to economies of scale.

If applicable, how does this project serve as a catalyst for future initiatives:

With proper care and maintenance mobile dental equipment has a 10-20 year life span. Medworks purchase of 25 portable dental chairs, portable dental units and autoclaves, can provide dental services to 1,000's of individuals throughout the next decade and beyond.

Medworks quarterly dental clinics will be the catalyst for bringing regularly scheduled, needed services to zip codes throughout Cuyahoga County. Such dental clinics will provide an opportunity to more frequently utilize Medworks vision equipment, bringing vision exams and free eyeglass distribution more regularly to those in need. Additionally general medical and specialty care services will be offered at each clinic. Specialty services will include those that address the highest need in Cleveland and Cuyahoga County and that address the highest incidence of chronic disease. This list may include but will not be limited to, podiatry, endocrinology, pulmonology, allergy and asthma care, mental health care, HIV screening and counseling and much more.

Total Budget of Project:

\$324,150 complete budget attached

Based on the high cost of renting dental equipment, this project will pay for itself in little over a year yet will provide care for the next decade.

Other Funding Sources of Project (list each source and dollar amount separately):

For nearly 15 years, Medworks has slowly grown and expanded its services in response to community need. To do so, the organization has relied on a network of support from individuals, foundations, corporations, and its annual fundraiser. Given more recent awareness of the significance of oral health, Medworks stakeholders are gradually increasing their commitment to support FREE oral health and dental care for ALL.

Medworks raises restricted dollars for Oral Health and Dental Care annually to support direct costs associated with its dental clinic. Additional dollars are raised to support operating costs such as salaries and administration.

ARPA funds earned will cover the one-time cost of dental equipment, serving as valuable seed money to launch a newly expanded model for Medworks FREE dental care. Additional associated costs will be sought from Medworks current stakeholders and new.

Current committed dental sponsors include, Delta Dental (40K), PCP & Ponsky Family (45K), Thatcher Family Fund (15K), Parker Hannifin Foundation (\$7,500)

Committed operating supporters include, Mt. Sinai Healthcare Foundation (\$115K), The Cleveland Foundation (75K), Elizabeth Prentiss Severance Foundation (45K), Abington Foundation (30K), Bruening Foundation(15K), and several others.

Medworks earns reoccurring annual revenue from federal sources to support its CANs and work in the criminal justice center. These sources include the Center for Medicaid and Medicare Services (210K), Cuyahoga County (45K) and the Charitable Health Network (12K).

Additional annual resources come from Medworks annual fundraiser, annual campaign and corporate sponsors and individual donors.

Total amount requested of County Council American Resource Act Dollars:

\$250,000

Since these are one-time dollars, how will the Project be sustained moving forward:

ARPA dollars awarded to Medworks, will be used for one-time costs associated with the purchase of 25 mobile dental chairs, mobile dental chests (air compressor/dental tools, hand pieces) autoclaves (instrument sanitization stations) high and low speed handheld instruments and set up costs. With proper care and maintenance such equipment will last for 10-20+ years. Additional budgeted expenses will provide for project oversight from a trained dental professional, educational and way finding signage for use at clinics, patient data base prescription fee, administrative costs and bins/shelving to safely store and organize dental equipment.

Medworks has successfully raised funds to support FREE dental services for the Cleveland community for nearly 15 years and has graciously been supported by a few of Cleveland's largest foundations since its inception. While expanding services will increase costs, those interested in addressing health disparities in Cleveland are fully aware of the significance of Oral Health and Dental Care in each individual's overall health. Medworks will be building on a delivery model that has proven efficacy. Given an existing need that is bound to increase with changes in health safety-net services such as Medicare eligibility and an already overburdened network of dental services provided through FQHC's, the need for Medworks to expand its Oral Health and Dental Care is bound to increase. Medworks has grown since its inception and continues to refine and perfect its service delivery models. As long as

need exists, Medworks will continue to deliver unconditional care in Cuyahoga County.

Organization History

Medworks, founded in 2009, was created to address the lack of healthcare access for a growing number of vulnerable populations in Northeast Ohio. At the onset, the organization's focus was to address unmet, acute medical needs. Today, Medworks has evolved to become an important non-competitive portal into Cleveland's diverse healthcare system. Medworks provides 100% FREE medical, dental, vision, and mental health care to uninsured and underinsured residents of Cuyahoga County/Northeast Ohio with no qualification questions asked. Medworks Navigators work to connect these individuals to ongoing care, through health insurance, medical homes, and other needed social services. WHEREAS, since all the ARPA dollars have been calculated as loss revenue, the ARPA dollars have been deposited in the County's General Fund; and

WHEREAS, Hazelwood Court, LLC is estimating the start date of the project will be September 2022 and the project will be completed by December 2023; and

WHEREAS, Hazelwood Court, LLC requested \$100,000 from the District 8 ARPA Community Grant Fund to complete this project; and

WHEREAS, the Cuyahoga County Council desires to provide funding in the amount of \$100,000 to Hazelwood Court, LLC to ensure this project is completed; and

WHEREAS, this Council by a vote of at least eight (8) members determines that it is necessary that this Resolution become immediately effective in order that critical services provided by Cuyahoga County can continue to provide for the usually, daily operations of the County.

PROJECT DESCRIPTION

REQUEST DESCRIPTION (include the project name, a description of the project, why the project is important or needed, and timeline of milestones/tracking of the project):

Jennings and PIRHL Developers have partnered to propose Beacon Grove aka Hazelwood Court, a 53-unit senior community that will serve Maple Heights' independent seniors 62 and older who have incomes between 30% and 60% of AMI.

Maple Heights has an aging population and limited affordable rental housing with supportive services to assist residents age in their community. In addition to the overall limited supply of housing with services, the type of senior service provision available at Hazelwood Court is not widely available at an affordable rate in the Maple Heights area. All typical senior affordable housing developments nearby are 100% occupied, and the combined waiting lists for these properties currently have over 250 households. Jennings currently has 275 of inquiries for individuals who are interested in living at Beacon Grove.

Hazelwood Court, which is a 53-unit 3-story apartment building, is located within one mile of the Maple Heights Senior Center and near services, retail, and healthcare. Residents will also have access to a suite of on-site supportive services and will be connected with numerous community-based services through the assistance of an on-site service coordinator. The building will incorporate green design and operating features to achieve NGBS Silver certification.

Hazelwood Court is going to address the need for quality affordable housing for seniors and won the support of the City of Maple Heights, which donated 17 parcels of vacant land that comprise the development site.

It should be noted that Jennings and PIRHL decided to move forward with construction in the fall of 2022 despite a large funding gap to ensure the delivery of critically needed affordable, accessible senior housing to Maple Heights. Without additional resources, however, the project was set up for financial challenges. As it was, an additional \$1 million in affordable housing tax credits from the Ohio Housing Finance Agency (which translated to \$960,000 in additional equity from KeyBank) was required to create enough liquidity to even close the project. Ensuing construction cost increases and interest rate increases have only brought more pressure to bear.

One significant element that sets Hazelwood Court apart from most other affordable housing projects is that the development team is constructing a new public roadway and associated utilities to access the site. This new roadway, named Beacon Court, is approximately 325 feet long and adds \$547,400 to the project budget. As a spillover benefit, this new roadway also opens two previously inaccessible lots for development—these lots are not owned by the project team and will be available for spin-off private development by another party. The parcels, numbers 781-19-052 and 781-19-053, are currently tax delinquent and may be in the tax foreclosure process.

Additionally, Hazelwood Court will be wired for broadband internet access and will provide basic wifi at no charge for all residents. We know that increasing internet access is a county priority, and it is often the case that seniors, and especially those of lower income, struggle to afford quality internet access. With the move to telehealth and online benefits management, stable, reliable, affordable internet access is a critical piece of wellbeing. The addition of the broadband and wifi systems alone contributes approximately \$50,000 to the project budget.

The project is expected to be complete with construction at the end of 2023, we will begin to lease-up immediately after construction is complete.
