CUYAHOGA COUNTY ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT & PLANNING COMMITTEE MEETING MONDAY, JULY 9, 2012 CUYAHOGA COUNTY JUSTICE CENTER COUNCIL CHAMBERS – 1<sup>ST</sup> FLOOR 1:00 PM

1. CALL TO ORDER

The meeting was called to order by Chairman Schron at 1:08 p.m.

2. ROLL CALL

Deputy Clerk Barnhill called the roll. Committee members Schron, Brady, Greenspan, Germana, Connally and Rogers were in attendance and a quorum was determined. Committee member Gallagher entered the meeting shortly after the roll call was taken. Councilmember Miller was also in attendance.

3. PUBLIC COMMENT RELATED TO THE AGENDA

No public comments were given.

4. APPROVAL OF MINUTES FROM JUNE 25, 2012 MEETING

A motion was made by Mr. Greenspan, seconded by Ms. Connally and approved by unanimous vote to approve the minutes of the June 25, 2012 meeting.

- 5. MATTERS REFERRED TO COMMITTEE
  - a) <u>R2012-0126</u>: A Resolution authorizing amendments to agreements and contracts with various providers for the Workforce Investment Act In-School and Out-of-School Youth Training Programs for various time periods to extend the time periods to 6/30/2013, and for additional funds; authorizing the County Executive to execute the amendments and all other documents consistent with this Resolution; and declaring the necessity that this Resolution become immediately effective:

The B-W Scholars Program provides its participants with opportunities to have the individualized support and assistance needed to successfully graduate from high school and pursue post-secondary education and training. The program is designed to offer year-round support to African-American males, beginning in 9<sup>th</sup> grade. The program features year-round services including mentoring, tutoring, community service, career development, and social support activities. Each summer students participate in an intensive Summer Academy on campus at Baldwin-Wallace College, followed by a paid Summer Internship. The B-W Scholars Program is based at John Adams High School.

Programs are designed to serve a wide range of students with the need for specialized vocational training. These programs include multiple center based and community-based training opportunities with an emphasis on employment and the development of critical work behaviors.

LEAP's Job Link and High School/High Tech Youth Development and Transition Programs are year-round and designed for high school students with disabilities. The goal is to help these youth to stay in school, matriculate, graduate, and gain employment and/or enroll in post-secondary education. Programming provides hard and soft skills training for employability along with services and supports to assist these youth in academic success, leading to high school graduation, post-secondary training or education, and, ultimately, sustainable employment (with benefits and a living wage), and self-sufficiency. Youth with a variety of disabilities are served in 9<sup>th</sup> through 12<sup>th</sup> grade, with support for further education or training and/or job placement services and supports for academic success and drop-out prevention. The target population is younger (ages 14-18) in-school youth with disabilities. Referrals of WIA eligible youth are made at the start of their 9<sup>th</sup> or 10<sup>th</sup> grade school year. Documented proof of disability is required.

Open Doors Academy is a developmental enrichment program for adolescent youth. We seek to nurture, protect, inspire, and challenge youth to reach their full potential through meaningful out-of-school activities.

Open Doors Academy currently serves five middle schools (Central Middle School - Euclid; Forest Park Middle School - Euclid; Miles Park Elementary Cleveland; Roxboro Middle School - Cleveland Heights; Wiley Middle School - University Heights) and three high school communities (Cleveland Heights; Cleveland (Miles Park Neighborhood); and Euclid).

Students enrolled in our middle school programs are automatically promoted to our high school programs and given preference for open spaces. Students not enrolled in the middle school program, can apply for a space by contacting us. Open Doors Academy seeks to ensure that every child have the opportunity and support needed to graduate high school and obtain entrance into a college institution or trade school.

High School/ Alumni programming consists of providing tutoring twice a week from 3 p.m. to 5 p.m., opportunities for volunteering in the community, summer paid/unpaid internships, weekly evening apprenticeships focused on developing 21<sup>st</sup> century work skills, college tours, national service learning trips, and individual mentoring and support. Youth enrolled in the program must commit to maintaining a minimum GPA, meeting bi-weekly with their mentor, participating in the weekly apprenticeship, and giving back to the community. In return, each youth will receive complete support, guidance, and the tools necessary to obtain successful post-secondary admittance into a University, trade school, or unsubsidized employment.

The Youth One-Stop serves Out -of-School youth, ages 18-21 and is a collaborative effort between Guidestone and Catapult Learning.

Youth will receive individualized programming based on results from our comprehensive assessment process. The program provides two tracks to employment. 1) Fast Track- youth who are considered job ready, and 2) Skill Building Track- youth who are in need of more intensive job preparation. Upon completion of the program, youth will either enter employment, enroll in a training/certificate program or enroll in post secondary education.
