

The Office of Budget & Management requests that the members of County Council consider the attached fiscal resolution for approval on first reading at the meeting on **April 25, 2017**. The requested fiscal items, including additional appropriations, appropriation transfers, and cash transfers, are necessary to cover expenses.

This agenda includes a request to transfer appropriation within the General Fund to the Medical Examiner's Office to support a PRN pathologist to address rising caseloads, predominantly driven by heroin and fentanyl related deaths. Cases involving heroin, fentanyl, or a combination of the two have increased 27% in the 1st Quarter of 2017 compared with the same time period in 2016 and have increased 145% since the 1st Quarter of 2015. Based on current caseload data, all but two of the existing pathologists are projected to exceed the



maximum number of autopsies to be performed in a year based on the National Association of Medical Examiner accreditation standards. For each pathologist that exceeds 250 autopsies in a year, the Office will

receive a Phase I deficiency. For each pathologist that exceeds 325 autopsies in a year the Office will receive a Phase II deficiency. The Office will lose its accreditation if it receives either 20 Phase I or five Phase II deficiencies. In 2016, the Office received four Phase II deficiencies: three of the pathologists performed in excess of 325 autopsies and the toxicology lab was cited for exceeding turnaround deadlines (90 days).

The increase in caseloads also reflects an increase in autopsies performed – for a fee – for other counties. Through March 2017, out-of-county autopsies totaled 97, an increase of 70% from 2016. The funding requested is an estimate of the not-to-exceed cost for the year, but not necessarily a commitment to spend. The contract will be drawn on only if caseloads continue to increase such that the staff pathologists will exceed the maximum number of autopsies to be performed in a year. The Medical Examiner's Office is increasing the fee charged to other jurisdictions for the performance of autopsies as contracts are being renewed; the rates for several entities increased by \$200 effective this past March. This revenue is deposited into a special revenue fund – the Lab Fund – that is used to pay for personnel, supplies, and equipment in the Medical Examiner's Office that would otherwise be supported by the County's General Fund. The \$200,000 is being transferred from the Miscellaneous Obligations budget in the General Fund, which included a \$2 million allocation for contingencies. This is the second transfer from this allocation; the first was an \$84,711 transfer approved by Council on the March 28th fiscal agenda to support an additional

staff person in Communications Department.

This agenda also includes a request to transfer cash from the General Fund to the RTA for employee bus passes. The County provides a \$38 subsidy to participating employees, which equates to approximately 42% of the total cost. There are currently approximately 450 employees County-wide receiving this subsidy.

Additional Appropriation Summary – Additional appropriation is requested when to cover expenditures that exceeds the original estimate and must be supported by a revenue source. A reduction in appropriation is requested in conjunction with the close-out of a program, grant, or decertification of an encumbrance.

Briefly describe the proposed procurement method.

We propose to utilize an RFP exemption as the procurement method for this contract.

Why is this method preferred over the standard, competitive procedure?

The State of Ohio established a Multiple Award Contract (MAC) with all vendors of electronic pollbooks certified in the State, which included the selected vendor for this contract. The pricing and terms of this contract are largely based on the competitively-bid state term MAC. However, this contract also includes discounted pricing and will include additional contract terms, per the request of the Board Members of the Board of Elections, that will strengthen the contract to further protect the Agency as well as the voters of Cuyahoga County. The additional provisions will include terms such as requiring the vendor to ensure it continues meeting all state and federal certifications and standards related to election equipment and to ensure its software remains compatible with our voter registration system throughout the contract term.

Were other vendors evaluated? If not, explain.

Yes, the Board of Elections conducted a 17-month vendor evaluation and selection process which included product demonstrations from all vendors certified in the State of Ohio. After BOE staff

identified its top three vendors, the Department of IT conducted an IT security review on our behalf of those top three vendors' systems. Eventually, one of the three vendors voluntarily withdrew from the evaluation and selection process. For the two finalist vendors, we conducted multiple pilot projects, a mock election, site visits to each vendor's headquarters, and a financial evaluation completed by the Cuyahoga County Fiscal Office. We also evaluated the performance of each vendor's customers in the November 8, 2016 Presidential General Election. From our research, we determined that Tenex Software Solutions not only could provide a superior product but also could do so at a better price than the other finalist vendor.
