NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF CUYAHOGA COUNTY, OHIO:

SECTION 1. The 2017 Cuyahoga County Sustainability Plan, including all changes thereto approved by Council, is hereby adopted in accordance with Section 202.18 of the Cuyahoga County Code. The final plan adopted herein includes such changes the Council and the County Executive have agreed upon prior to adoption.

SECTION 2. It is necessary that this Resolution become immediately effective for the usual daily operation of the County and the reasons set forth in the preamble. Department Strategy 1: Work collaboratively with our partners to reduce greenhouse gas emissions in the geographic confines of Cuyahoga County

Initiatives:

- 1: Join with other cities and organizations to formulate a comprehensive Cuyahoga County Climate Change Action Plan that deals with both mitigation and adaptation by August 2018.
- 2: Join with other cities and organizations by declaring an adherence to the Paris Climate Accords by September 1, 2017.
- **3:** Determine a measurement and reporting protocol by January of 2018.
- 4: Measure all greenhouse gas emissions in Cuyahoga County by the spring of 2018 and set realistic greenhouse gas reduction goals and strategies by July 2018.

A Resolution authorizing the Veterans Service Commission to issue Ohio veterans identification cards to qualified individuals, and declaring the necessity that this Resolution become immediately effective.

WHEREAS, Section 317.241 of the Ohio Revised Code provides that County Council "may by resolution allow the county recorder or county veterans service office to issue Ohio veterans identification cards to individuals" who meet specified requirements; and,

WHEREAS, Charter Section 5.02 provides that the Fiscal Officer "shall exercise all powers and perform all duties now or hereafter vested in or imposed by general law upon county auditors and county recorders and the powers and duties of the clerk of court of common pleas other than those powers and duties related to serving the operation of the courts, and such other powers and duties not inconsistent therewith as provided herein or by ordinance;" and,

WHEREAS, commencing in July, 2013, the Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer has provided veterans identification cards to Cuyahoga County Veterans; and,

WHEREAS Section 317.241 of the Ohio Revised Code further provides that "[a] county recorder or county veterans service office who has in operation, before the effective date of this section, a program to issue veterans identification cards may continue to issue veterans identification cards without a resolution of the board of county commissioners, if the county recorder or county veterans service office conforms the program, as necessary, so that it otherwise is in compliance with this section;" and,

WHEREAS, the Cuyahoga County Veterans Service Commission now seeks to issue veterans identification cards at no cost to Cuyahoga County veterans; and,

WHEREAS, veterans identification cards provide military veterans proof of their veteran status in lieu of their DD214 military discharge papers when applying for services, benefits, or discounts; and,

WHEREAS, it is necessary that this Resolution become immediately effective in order that critical services provided by Cuyahoga County can continue and to provide for the usual, daily operation of a County entity.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF CUYAHOGA COUNTY, OHIO:

WHEREAS, Article IX of the Charter of Cuyahoga County creates a Personnel Review Commission that shall be responsible for administering, for and in cooperation with the officers, agencies, boards and commissions of the County, an efficient and economical system for the employment of persons in the public service of the County according to merit and fitness; and

WHEREAS, Section 9.01 of the Charter of Cuyahoga County states that the County's human resources policies and systems shall be established by ordinance and shall be administered in such a manner as will eliminate unnecessary expense and duplication of effort, while ensuring that persons will be employed in the public service without discrimination on the basis of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, sexual orientation, disability, age or ancestry; and

WHERAS, the County's current Civil Service System is codified in Chapter 124 of the Ohio Revised Code, Chapter 123:1 of the Ohio Administrative Code, the Cuyahoga County Administrative Rules and the Policies and Procedures Manual; and

WHEREAS, Section 2.10 of the Cuyahoga County Personnel Policies and Procedures Manual (Ordinance Nos. O2011-0015 and O2011-0028) states that the employment of all classified County employees is subject to the provisions of the Ohio Revised Code (Chapter 124), the Ohio Administrative Code (Chapter 123:1), the Cuyahoga County Administrative Rules and the Policies and Procedures Manual; and

WHEREAS, Section 301.23 of the Ohio Revised Code authorizes a charter-created county civil service commission to create a new system for employment with the county on the basis of merit and fitness, as ascertained by competitive examination; and

WHEREAS, Section 303.02 of the Cuyahoga County Code defines "promotion" as "the appointment of an employee to a different position assigned a higher pay range than the employee's previous position."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF CUYAHOGA COUNTY, OHIO:

SECTION 1. Council hereby amends Section 303.05 of the Cuyahoga County Code as follows (additions are underlined and bolded; deletions are stricken):

Section 303.05 Appointments

A. Original Appointments

A person who has been selected by an Appointing Authority from an eligibility list that is established by the Personnel Review Commission to fill a vacancy in the classified service is said to have received an original appointment. Those persons receiving original appointments do not become permanent employees until they have satisfied the applicable probationary period.

B. Temporary Appointments

Temporary appointments shall not exceed one hundred eighty (180) days in duration and shall be filled in the following manner:

1. Eligibility List

If an applicable eligibility list is available, the temporary appointment shall be offered to the candidates on the eligibility list, provided that the acceptance or declination of appointment to such position shall not affect the right of an eligible person to certification for appointment to a permanent position. At the expiration of the temporary appointment, which in no case shall exceed one hundred eighty (180) days, the services of the temporary employee shall be terminated and the candidate shall be restored to the eligibility list in rank order.

2. No Applicable Eligibility List

In the absence of an applicable eligibility list, the Appointing Authority may appoint a qualified person for a temporary period of service, not to exceed one hundred eighty (180) days in duration, when the need of service is urgent and necessary to prevent the loss of public property, serious inconvenience to the public, or damaging delay to the public service. In the event of a subsequent appointment to a permanent position, the temporary appointment shall not be counted as part of a probationary period. Successive temporary appointments to the same position are prohibited. Temporary appointments made necessary by reason of sickness, disability, or other approved leave of absence shall not continue beyond such period of sickness, disability, or other absence.

C. Promotional Selection

Vacancies may be filled by promotion, as practicable. An appointing authority may either request an eligibility list from the PRC or make a promotion on the

basis of merit and conduct and capacity in office via a posting internal to Cuyahoga County.

- 1. For the purposes of Section 303.05(C):
 - (a) "Merit" shall be determined by utilizing a structured interview or assessment tool developed by the Human Resources Department and approved by the Personnel Review Commission pursuant to paragraph (C)(2) of this Section.
 - (b) "Conduct and capacity in office" shall be determined by taking into consideration employee personnel records including, but not limited to, performance evaluations and active disciplinary record.
- 2. Before making a promotional appointment to a classified position, the Department of Human Resources shall develop and submit a structured interview or assessment tool to the Director of the Personnel Review Commission or his or her designee. The PRC Director or designee shall, within five business days, approve or disapprove the structured interview or assessment tool submitted by the Department of Human Resources. The Human Resources Department may request the PRC to develop a structured interview or assessment tool in lieu of seeking approval.
 - (a) If the PRC Director or designee approves of the structured interview or assessment tool, the PRC Director or designee shall notify the Director of Human Resources. The Department of Human Resources may use the approved tool for subsequent promotional appointments within the same classification; provided the minimum requirements for the classification have not changed.
 - (b) If the PRC Director or designee disapproves of the structured interview or assessment tool, the PRC Director or designee shall provide written objections and modifications, where appropriate. The Department and Human Resources and the Personnel Review Commission shall collaborate to develop a mutually agreeable solution.
 - (c) If the PRC Director or designee fails to respond within five business days, unless an extension of time is agreed to by both parties, the structured interview or assessment tool shall be deemed approved for the purposes of filling the immediate vacancy.

WHEREAS, the precipitous increase in plastic production and plastic consumption over the past seventy years has resulted in approximately 269,000 tons of globally distributed plastic waste pollution, particularly in oceans, lakes, and other marine waterways; and,

WHEREAS, plastic waste is not bio-degradable and recycled plastic suffers from polymer degradation, limiting its useful life as a recyclable material, inevitably resulting in non-biodegradable microplastic particle pollution; and,

WHEREAS, discarded disposable bags are a major source of litter, pollute our open spaces, harm and kill wildlife, clog storm drains resulting in localized flooding, end up as debris in our neighborhoods and waterways, and contributes to blight; and,

WHEREAS, the pollution from disposable bags imposes external cleanup, removal and processing costs on our communities; and,

WHEREAS, Cuyahoga County Council has a compelling public interest in discouraging the wasteful use of disposable bags, mitigating the negative impact disposable bags have on our environment, and in defraying the costs of preventing and remediating environmental hazards; and,

WHEREAS, Cuyahoga County Council desires to combat the polluting effects of and accompanying blight caused by disposable bags on the environment of Cuyahoga County as well as to promote sustainability in northeast Ohio by providing for a fund, specifically named the Environmental Remediation Fund, the purpose for which is to provide for critical pollution prevention, remediation, and sustainability services as set forth in this Ordinance.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF CUYAHOGA COUNTY, OHIO:

SECTION 1. Chapter 721 of the Cuyahoga County Code is hereby enacted to read as follows:

CHAPTER 721: Carryout Bag Fee for Environmental Remediation

Section 721.01: Definitions: The following definitions shall apply for purposes of Chapter 721 of the County Code only:

- (A) "Carryout Bag" means a paper or plastic bag provided by a Retail Establishment to a customer at point of sale to carry purchased items. Carryout Bag does not include:
 - 1. a bag the customer brought with them to the Retail Establishment,
 - 2. a newspaper bag,
 - 3. a bag provided by a pharmacist that contains a prescription drug,
 - 4. a bag used to package a bulk item or to contain or wrap a perishable item,
 - 5. a bag that a restaurant gives a customer to take prepared or leftover food or drink from the restaurant,
 - 6. a bag intended for use as a dry cleaning, garbage, pet waste, or yard waste bag, or
 - 7. a bag provided at curbside pickup or point of delivery.
- (B) "Environmental Remediation Fund" means such fund that shall be established by Cuyahoga County ("County") to collect and expend the fees as defined and outlined under the Chapter.
- (C) "Occasional Retailer" means a retail establishment that engages in the retail sale of goods and/or food no more than 20 days in any given year.
- (D) "Retail Establishment" means any supermarket, convenience store, department store, store, shop, service station, or restaurant and any other sales outlets where the vendor maintains an indoor footprint of 7,000 square feet or greater where a customer can buy goods and/or food that is not an Occasional Retailer as defined herein.

Section 721.02: Carryout Bag Fee Imposed

- (A) Commencing on July 1, 2018, a fee in the amount of ten cents shall be charged by the Retail Establishment to each customer for each Carryout Bag that a Retail Establishment provides to the customer.
- (B) Each Retail Establishment that provides a Carryout Bag to a customer must collect the fee referenced herein when the customer makes any payment for goods and/or food in person, through the Internet, by telephone, by wire, by facsimile, email or by any other means.
- (C) Each Retail Establishment shall encourage customers to bring their own reusable bags and customers who bring their own reusable bags to the Retail Establishment will not be required to use the Retail Establishment's Carryout Bags nor will they be charged a fee for the use of reusable bags.

- (D) Each Retail Establishment may retain up to four cents from each ten cent fee that the Retail Establishment collects to cover the administrative expense of collecting and remitting the fee to the County.
- (E) A Retail Establishment must indicate on each customer's transaction receipt the number of Carryout Bags that the Retail Establishment provided to the customer and the total amount of fee charged; provided, however that a Retail Establishment may, with prior approval of the Fiscal Officer, use an alternative methodology to estimate the total number of bags provided to each customer in lieu of recording each individual bag.

Section 721.03: Remittance of the Carryout Bag Fee

- (A) On or before the 20th day of each month, each Retail Establishment must remit to the Cuyahoga County Fiscal Officer the amount of fees collected for all Carryout Bags provided to a customer during the previous month, less the amount retained for administrative expenses under Section 721.02.
- (B) Each remittance must be accompanied by a report of all transactions and exemptions that involve Carryout Bags. The report must be on a form supplied by the County and must contain the number of Carryout Bags supplied or provided to customers, the amount of total fees required by this Chapter to be collected and any other information that the Fiscal Officer requires to assure the proper fees have been remitted to the County.
- (C) If the Retail Establishment does not file a required report by the deadline established herein, the County may estimate the amount of fees due. The County may base the estimate of a reasonable projection of Carryout Bags supplied or provided and may consider fees reported by other Retail Establishments.
- (D) The County may send a notice of estimated fees due including interest and penalty, to the Retail Establishment's last known address. The Retail Establishment must pay the estimated fees, including any interest and penalty assessed by the County within 10 days after the notice is sent.
- (E) Each Retail Establishment must preserve for 3 years all records necessary to determine the amount of the fees due or any exemptions claimed under this Chapter.
- (F) The County may inspect and/or audit any records required to be kept under this Chapter.
- (G) The County shall deposit all fees under this Chapter into the Environmental Remediation Fund, less any necessary and reasonable expenses required for collection and enforcement of this Chapter. The Environment Remediation Fund may be used to pay costs of, or reimbursement for, eligible environmental remediation expenses, including the purchase or reimbursement of reusable and/or environmentally sustainable bags, recycling, clean-up of lakes, rivers, and waterways, pollution prevention or remediation, litter removal, environmental

education and awareness, other environmental remediation activities or programs intended to combat the polluting effects of and accompanying blight caused by Carryout Bags on the environment in Cuyahoga County, and any administrative and oversight costs incurred by the County for any of the activities described herein.

Section 721.04: Interest and Penalties

- (A) If a Retail Establishment does not remit to the Fiscal Officer any fees owed under this Chapter when due, the Retail Establishment is liable for interest on collections at the rate of one percent per month for each month or part of a month after the remittance is due and a penalty of 5 percent of the amount of collections per month or part of a month after the remittance is due up to 25 percent of the fees collected.
- (B) The Retail Establishment must pay any interest and penalty as part of the remittance due under this Chapter.

Section 721.05: Prohibited Conduct

A Retail Establishment shall not:

- 1. Refuse to allow customers to bring with them and to use their own reusable bags;
- 2. Neglect or refuse to collect or remit the fee required under this Chapter;
- 3. File an incomplete, false, or fraudulent report to the Fiscal Officer;
- 4. Neglect or refuse to keep complete and accurate records; or
- 5. Refuse to allow the County to inspect and audit the Retail Establishment's records.

Section 721.06: Enforcement

The County may fine a Retail Establishment \$500 per violation in addition to the fees, penalties and interest described in the Chapter. Any violation may be appealed by the Retail Establishment to The Cuyahoga County Debarment Review Board established under Section 205.06 of the Cuyahoga County Code. The Cuyahoga County Debarment Review Board may establish administrative rules and/or procedures to adjudicate any appeals described herein. A determination by the Debarment Review Board may be appealed to the Cuyahoga County Common Pleas Court pursuant to Section 2506 of the Ohio Revised Code.

Section 721.07: Exemptions

If, at the point of sale, a customer presents a valid Ohio Electronic Benefit Transfer (EBT) card in the customer's name indicating that the customer is enrolled in the

federal Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, then the customer shall not be subject to the Carryout Bag Fee for the transaction, regardless of whether the customer uses their EBT card to purchase goods at the point of sale. The Retail Establishment shall document any such exemptions in a manner acceptable to the County. This Chapter remains subject to Article I, Section 1.02 of the Cuyahoga County Charter.

Section 721.08: Implementation of the Carryout Bag Fee for Environmental Remediation

The County Executive or designee may adopt, amend, and enforce regulations and/or administrative rules for the purpose of carrying out the functions, powers, and duties vested in and imposed upon county directors or agencies by this Chapter. The Director of Sustainability shall be responsible for the administration of the Environmental Remediation Fund in accordance with the Contracting and Purchasing Procedures as codified in Chapter 501 of this Code.

SECTION 2. It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of the Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

The Office of Budget & Management requests that the members of County Council consider the attached fiscal resolution for approval on first reading at the meeting on **October 10, 2017**. The requested fiscal items, including additional appropriations, appropriation transfers, and cash transfers, are necessary to cover expenses.

Of note on this agenda are the following requests:

- To appropriate \$2 million toward begin work on the Cleveland Police Headquarters Building, adjacent to the Justice Center. Council approved the purchase of this building via R2017-0103. This initial appropriation request will support the work necessary to allow staff and the lab to move into the building. This project has been added to the 2017 Capital Improvement Plan. The purchase, renovation, and relocation expenses associated with this project are estimated to total approximately \$16 million and is supported by the County's General Fund reserves: the 2017 cost is estimated to total \$2 million, the remaining expenses will post in 2018. The draw on reserves to support this project will not reduce the cash balance below the mandated minimum of 25%. Upon completion, this project will result in operational savings in the General Fund budget.
- To appropriate \$55,000 to repair the doors and locks at the Board of Elections building. This project was added to the 2017 Capital Improvement Plan, reducing the remaining amount available in 2017 for "special TBD projects" to \$130,427.
- To appropriate the Criminal Justice Intervention HHS Fund to transfer surplus cash in that fund back to the Health and Human Services Levy Fund. After the transfer posts, this Fund will be closed.
- To appropriate \$200,000 in the Real Estate Assessment Fund to support the purchase of permitting and code enforcement software that can be used by both County appraisal staff and municipalities within the County. This software will assist in establishing accurate real property values. The cash balance in the Real Estate Assessment Fund totals approximately \$25.7 million. This cash balance will be used to support the 2018 Sexennial Appraisal. Any remaining balance after the completion of the appraisal is to be returned to the taxing authorities per the Ohio Revised Code.
- To appropriate new Community Corrections Act (CCA) 407 and 408 grants in the Court of Common Pleas. The Court uses these grants to support expenses that would otherwise fall to the General Fund or the Health and Human Services Levy Fund for programs that divert individuals from the County Jail and provide services to victims of domestic violence and individuals with behavioral health (mental health/addiction) issues. In total, the Court's CCA grants for the FY18-19 biennium were approximately \$700,000 less than the previous award.

The Court is not seeking additional funding to compensate for this reduction but is instead using special revenue funds to maintain programming.

- To transfer prior year Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding awarded to the Department of Development that has not been spent to the current year grants accounts.
- To transfer surplus appropriation in the County's OPTIONS program, which provides home-based services to seniors in the community to support an increase in the demand for services for the elimination of bed bugs. The 2017 budget included \$100,000 for this service this request includes current year funding to \$150,000, which will be maintained in 2018. http://www.cleveland.com/metro/index.ssf/2017/08/cleveland is consistently rank.html





WHEREAS, Section 501.15 of the Cuyahoga County Code sets forth certain Required Certifications that shall be made by all Contractors; and

WHEREAS, the amendments proposed are designed to clarify and limit the requirements to applicable contract types; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that this Ordinance become immediately effective in order that critical services provided by Cuyahoga County can continue and to provide for the usual, daily operation of a County entity.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF CUYAHOGA COUNTY, OHIO:

SECTION 1. Section 501.15 of the Cuyahoga County Code is hereby amended to read as follows (additions are bolded and underlined, deletions are stricken):

Section 501.15 Required Certifications by Requirements of Contractors

- A. On federally or state funded projects, which require the County to comply with specific federal and/or state criteria or forms for certifications by the successful contractor(s), the County shall comply with the federal and/or state requirements to avoid the loss of federal or state funds, including the use of the federal and/or state certification forms in lieu of the County's mandated certification forms. Where possible on federally or state funded projects and on all other projects, at the time of execution of the contract, the successful contractor shall-certify that it:
 - for public improvements contracts, the contractor shall be in compliance with Ohio's Drug-Free Workplace requirements as provided in Ohio Revised Code Section 153.03., including, but not limited to, maintaining All contractors shall maintain a written substance abuse policy, that to which its personnel are subject toon the contract (the successful contractor shall provide this policy upon request);

- 2. <u>for public improvement contracts, the contractor does shall</u> not have an Experience Modification Rating greater than 1.5 with respect to the Bureau of Workers Compensation risk assessment rating;
- 3. <u>the contractor is in shall be</u> compliance and will remain in compliance with Federal and Ohio Equal Opportunity Employment Laws;
- 4. <u>for public improvement contracts, the contractor</u> shall pay the prevailing wage rate and comply with other provisions set forth in Sections 4115.03 through 4115.16 of the Ohio Revised Code and Sections 4101:9-4-01 through 4101:9-4-28 of the Ohio Administrative Code, including but not limited to the filing of certified payroll reports;
- 5. **for public improvement contracts, the contractor** has **shall** not **have** been debarred from public contracts for prevailing wage violations or found or determined by the state to have underpaid the required prevailing wage, whether intentionally or unintentionally, even if settled subsequent to the finding, more than three times in the last ten (ten) years, provided that, when aggregating for any single project, no finding of an underpaid amount of less than \$1,000.00 shall be considered, and no single finding based upon a journeyman-to-apprenticeship ratio shall be considered a violation of this provision unless as part of multiple, similar findings;
- 6. <u>the contractor has shall</u> not <u>have</u> been penalized or debarred from any federal, state, or local public contract or falsified certified payroll records, or has otherwise been found, after appeals, to have violated the Fair Labor Standards Act in the past seven years, or during the <u>contractor's bidder's</u> entire time of doing business, if less than seven years;
- 7. <u>the contractor has shall</u> not <u>have</u> violated any unemployment or workers compensation law during the past five years, or during the <u>contractor'sbidder's</u> entire time of doing business, if less than five years;
- 8. **the contractor,** at the time of contract award, does **shall** not have final, unsatisfied judgments against it which in total amount to 50% or more of the contract amount:
- 9. <u>the contractor will shall</u> utilize, for work performed under the contract supervisory personnel that have three or more years of experience in the specific trade and who maintain the appropriate state license(s), if any;
- 10. **the contractor** shall be properly licensed to perform all work as follows:
 - a. if performing a trades contract, shall be licensed pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 4740 as a heating, ventilating, and air

- conditioning contractor, refrigeration contractor, electrical contractor, plumbing contractor, or hydronix contractor.
- b. if performing work regulated under Section 3737.65 of the Ohio Revised Code, be certified by the State Fire Marshall; and
- c. if performing work under any other trade, occupation, or profession licensed under Title 47 of the Ohio Revised Code, be licensed for that trade, occupation, or profession as provided in the Ohio Revised Code;
- 11. <u>the contractor</u> shall, if performing a trade contract pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 4740, not subcontract more than 25% of the labor, excluding materials, for its awarded contract, unless to subcontractors also licensed pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 4740 or certified by the State Fire Marshall pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 3737.65;
- 12. <u>the contractor</u> shall provide access as needed and allow the Agency of Inspector General to perform the functions provided for in Section 501.21 of the County Code; and
- 13. <u>the contractor</u> shall require all of its subcontractors, at the time of execution of a subcontract, to make all of the certifications required in Section 501.15(A) except for subsections 7 and 9, of the County Code.
- B. If any material breach of contractual obligations or the certifications provided for in <u>this</u> Section-501.16 of the County Code occurs during the contract performance by the <u>vendorcontractor</u>, the County may exercise any or all contractual remedies, including but not limited to, contract termination for cause.

SECTION 2. It is necessary that this Ordinance become immediately effective for the usual daily operation of the County and the reasons set forth in the preamble. Provided that this Ordinance receives the affirmative vote of at least eight members of Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon the earliest occurrence of any of the following: (1) its approval by the County Executive through signature, (2) the expiration of the time during which it may be disapproved by the County Executive under Section 3.10(6) of the Cuyahoga County Charter, or (3) its passage by at least eight members of Council after disapproval pursuant to Section 3.10(7) of the Cuyahoga County Charter. Otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.
