Provided that this Ordinance receives the affirmative vote of at least eight members of Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon the earliest occurrence of any of the following: (1) its approval by the County Executive through signature, (2) the expiration of the time during which it may be disapproved by the County Executive under Section 3.10(6) of the Cuyahoga County Charter, or (3) its passage by at least eight members of Council after disapproval pursuant to Section 3.10(7) of the Cuyahoga County Charter. Otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

WHEREAS, the Agency of Inspector General was originally established by Cuyahoga County Council in 2011 pursuant to Ordinance No. O2011-0004, as amended and codified in Sections 204.01 and 407.01 of the Cuyahoga County Code; and

WHEREAS, Cuyahoga County Council unanimously referred to the ballot a charter amendment to formally incorporate the Agency of Inspector General into the Cuyahoga County Charter, which was approved by the county electors with the passage of Issue 12 at the November 6, 2018 general election; and

WHEREAS, the Inspector General is the chief ethics officer of Cuyahoga County and is charged with the responsibility of investigating and enforcing the ethics laws of Cuyahoga County as enacted in Title 4 of the Cuyahoga County Code; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that this Ordinance become immediately effective in order that critical services provided by Cuyahoga County can continue and to provide for the usual, daily operation of a County entity.

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF CUYAHOGA COUNTY, OHIO:

**SECTION 1.** Section 204.01 of the Cuyahoga County Code is hereby amended to read as follows (additions are underlined, deletions are stricken):

#### Section 204.01 Agency of the Inspector General

A. Definitions As used in Section 204.01 of the Cuyahoga County Code:

- 1. "Agency" shall refer to the Agency of the Cuyahoga County Inspector General established herein.
- 2. "Cause" for purposes of removal for cause shall have the same meaning as legitimate cause under Ohio's civil service law.
- 3. "Employee" / "Employees" shall mean County employees who operate within the County government established by the Cuyahoga County Charter.

# 4. "Investigation" means an examination, review, inquiry, study, inspection, analysis, probe, or appraisal.

- 4<u>5</u>. "Public Official" / "Public Officials" shall mean the public officials of the Cuyahoga County government established by the Cuyahoga County Charter.
- 56. "County Contracts" shall mean all contracts to which the County is a party, excluding collective bargaining contracts and contracts with any other governmental entity.
- B. The Cuyahoga County Inspector General Agency.
  - 1. Establishment. There is hereby established the Agency of Inspector General to be known as the "Cuyahoga County Inspector General."
  - 2. Direction of Agency. The Inspector General shall direct the Agency and shall employ assistants and employees as shall be reasonably necessary to assist the Inspector General in carrying out the duties of the Agency in accordance with the budget parameters set forth in this Chapter. In employing the assistants and other employees, the Inspector General shall comply with the hiring rules, regulations and processes of the Human Resource Department of Cuyahoga County.
  - 3. Investigative Powers and Duties. The Inspector General is hereby appointed to conduct examinations investigations under Section 2.05 and Article XV of the County Charter and shall, therefore, have all such rights and duties to investigate fraud, corruption, waste, abuse, misfeasance, malfeasance, and nonfeasance without interference or pressure from any other Public Official or Employee. The Inspector General shall also perform all of the following:
    - a. The Inspector General shall serve as the County's chief ethics officer and is charged with the responsibility of investigating and enforcing Title 4 of the County Code in accordance with the terms of said Title. In so doing, the Inspector General shall cooperate with the County's Personnel Review Commission. The Inspector General shall not interfere with the authority of the Personnel Review Commission to ensure "compliance with ethics resolutions or ordinances as passed by the Council" under Section 9.02(3) of the County Charter.

- b. The Inspector General shall establish a "hotline" and web site to receive complaints from either anonymous or identified persons, and s/he shall investigate all complaints, tips, and any other filings and submittals received by the Agency regardless of the format or forum through which such information or documents are received. Without regard to how such documents are received by the Agency, all documents prepared or received by the Agency, including, without limitation, all complaints, tips, and any other filings and submittals received by it shall be considered part of the Inspector General's investigative files, provided however, the Inspector General may take steps to preserve the anonymity of complainants or sources in compliance with Ohio Public Records law.
- c. The Inspector General shall have the powers and rights to investigate all county contracts subject to the limitations set forth in Section 204.01(B)(4) of this Chapter.
- d. If an investigation reveals reasonable grounds to believe that a violation of any state, federal, or local law, rule, regulation, or policy has taken place, the Inspector General shall notify the appropriate civil, criminal, or administrative agencies in charge with enforcement of said violation. If an investigation reveals reasonable grounds to believe that a violation of a rule, regulation, or policy governing a County employee has taken place, the Inspector General shall notify the employee's appointing authority and the applicable Department of Human Resources.
- e. The County Executive or designee shall be required to provide a response to any investigation in which the Inspector General recommends an agency or department under the jurisdiction of the County Executive take a particular action. Prior to completing an investigation, the Inspector General may provide an opportunity for the County Executive or designee to submit a response for inclusion in the Inspector General's report or recommendations. If the Inspector General declines to provide such an opportunity, the County Executive or designee shall provide a response to the Inspector General within thirty days following the publication of an investigative report. Such response shall indicate whether the County Executive agrees or disagrees with individual recommendations.
  - i. If the County Executive or designee agrees with a particular recommendation made by the Inspector General, the response shall specify what remedial actions, if any, will be taken.
  - <u>ii. If the County Executive or designee disagrees with a particular recommendation made by the Inspector General, the response shall include a rationale for such disagreement.</u>

f. All agencies, offices, or departments that are under the investigatory jurisdiction of the Inspector General but not under the jurisdiction of the County Executive shall provide responses to any recommendations made by the Inspector General in the same manner as provided in paragraph (e) of this Section. Such response shall be provided by the chairperson, executive director, chief of staff, or similar managerial position, or their designee, as may be applicable for the particular agency, office, or department.

eg. The Inspector General shall cooperate with other governmental agencies to recover such costs from other entities involved in willful misconduct in regard to County funds and return said funds to the County's General Fund.

# h. The Inspector General shall have the authority to issue subpoenas in accordance with Article XV of the County Charter.

£i. The Inspector General shall prepare and publish on its website semiannual reports (the first of which will cover the period January 1st – June 30th and will be due in July and the second of which will cover the period July 1st – December 31st and will be due in February) concerning the work and activities of the Agency pertaining to closed investigations, including statistical information regarding the disposition of closed investigations, audits, and other reviews, and a summary of the Inspector General's recommendations and corresponding responses. The reports shall include the total number of complaints received during each reporting period, the number that required active investigation, the number that resulted in prosecution or other disciplinary actions, and the number of investigations closed, along with the cost incurred over and above that of the cost of the salaries of the Agency.

#### 4. Limitations on the Inspector General's Investigative Powers and Duties.

- a. No Interference with Ongoing Investigations. The Inspector General shall not interfere with any ongoing criminal, administrative, or civil investigation or prosecution in the performance of his/her duties. If necessary, the Inspector General shall suspend all investigative activities to ensure that the Agency's actions do not interfere with any such investigations.
- b. Protection of Constitutional and Civil Rights. The Inspector General shall manage the Agency and conduct all investigations in accordance with law and in a manner that protects the constitutional and civil rights of any person who is the subject of an investigation as well as the constitutional and civil rights of any potential witnesses. The Inspector General shall adopt policies and procedures to ensure that such protections are in place in conducting any investigations or performing any other function.

- c. Effect on Contracts. The enactment of this Code shall not be interpreted to interfere with or change the terms of any contracts with the County in place at the time of its enactment. All contracts and contract amendments entered into on or after the effective date of this Chapter, however, shall be subject to the requirements of this Chapter. In addition to the County's powers to enforce this Code under its home rule powers, this Chapter, including all obligations by contractors, shall be considered a material term of all contracts or contract amendments entered with the County on or after the effective date of this Chapter, and all contractors shall comply with its requirements as a material term of their contracts with the County. All Inspector General inspections or investigations of a contractor shall specifically relate to a contract with the County.
- d. Relationship with Inspector General. The Inspector General shall cooperate with the Department of Internal Auditing to avoid duplication of effort and to share information, so long as such sharing does not compromise an ongoing investigation. At the request of the Inspector General and with the approval of the Internal Auditor, the Department of Internal Auditing may provide services to the Inspector General for a specific investigation. The Inspector General shall not interfere with the authority of the Internal Audit Department to conduct audits pursuant to the Charter, any applicable ordinances, and any rules established by the Internal Audit Committee.
- 5. Inspector General's Budget. The Inspector General's budget shall be submitted as part of the county's biennial budget process in accordance with Article XV of the County Charter. Nothing contained herein shall be construed to prohibit the Inspector General from transmitting to the Council supplemental budget requests, which shall be reviewed and considered in the normal budgetary process.
  - a. Initial Budget. Through the remainder of the year 2011, the Inspector General's budget shall be \$375,000.00.
  - b. Subsequent Annual Budget. With the benefit of having experienced the needs and expenses of the Agency for the year 2011, the Inspector General shall submit a proposed budget for the year 2012 in accordance with the time parameters of Council's regular budgetary practices.
  - c. Requests for Additional Funding. Nothing contained herein shall be construed to prohibit the Inspector General from transmitting to the Council supplemental budget requests, which shall be reviewed and considered in the normal budgetary process.
- 6. Agency's Facilities, Furniture, Equipment and Software. The County shall exercise good faith efforts to provide the Agency with appropriately located office

space and sufficient physical facilities, including office furniture, equipment, and software, commensurate with other County departments of similar size and needs.

- C. Selection, Term, Qualifications, and Removal of Inspector General.
  - 1. Incumbent Inspector General. Without regard to the appointment requirements of Section 204.01(C)(2) herein, and subject to the removal provisions of Section 204.01(D) herein, the incumbent Inspector General, Nailah Byrd, shall have the right to continue to serve as the County's first Inspector General without confirmation of Council until June 30, 2016.
  - 21. Appointment of Inspector General. The Inspector General shall be appointed by the County Executive for a term of five four years subject to confirmation by Council in accordance with Article XV of the County Charter. In the case of a vacancy in the position of Inspector General, the Executive shall appoint a successor Inspector General, subject to the confirmation of Council, to the term of the Inspector General. The Executive may appoint, with the approval of the President of Council, an Interim Inspector General for a period not to exceed 90 days.
  - 32. Term of Office of Inspector General. The term of the Inspector General shall be fixed in accordance with Article XV of the County Charterfor five years.
  - 43. Qualifications of Inspector General. The qualifications of the Inspector General are specified in Article XV of the County Charter. In appointing and confirming the Inspector General, the Executive and the Council shall exercise good faith efforts to seek highly qualified candidates who have demonstrated the ability to work with local, state, and federal law enforcement agencies and who have audit-related skills and professional certifications in relevant fields. The selected Inspector General shall have the following minimum qualifications:

a. A juris doctorate degree from an accredited institution of higher learning; and.

b. At least ten years' experience in any one or a combination of the following fields:

i. as a federal, state, or local law enforcement agent/official;

ii. as a licensed attorney;

iii. as an inspector general, certified public accountant, or internal auditor; or

iv. as a person with escalating supervisory and managerial experience in an investigative public agency similar to an inspector general's agency.

D. Removal. The Inspector General may only be removed from office for cause <u>in</u> <u>accordance with Article XV of the County Charter</u>. Either the Executive or Council may initiate the process to remove the Inspector General by resolution before Council. To effectuate such removal, the resolution must receive the affirmative vote of at least eight members of Council.

E. Abolition of the Office. The Agency of the Inspector General shall only be abolished upon the affirmative vote of at least eight members of Council and executed by the Executive.

F. No Classified Positions. Nothing in this Chapter, including the removal procedures, is intended to make the position of Inspector General or any of its employees a classified employee of the County.

**SECTION 2.** It is necessary that this Ordinance become immediately effective for the usual daily operation of the County and the reasons set forth in the preamble. Provided that this Ordinance receives the affirmative vote of at least eight members of Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon the earliest occurrence of any of the following: (1) its approval by the County Executive through signature, (2) the expiration of the time during which it may be disapproved by the County Executive under Section 3.10(6) of the Cuyahoga County Charter, or (3) its passage by at least eight members of Council after disapproval pursuant to Section 3.10(7) of the Cuyahoga County Charter. Otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.


RE: Fiscal Agenda – 4/23/2019

The Office of Budget & Management requests that the members of County Council consider the attached fiscal resolution for approval on first reading at the meeting on **April 23, 2019**. The requested fiscal items, including additional appropriations, appropriation transfers, and cash transfers, are necessary to ensure sufficient appropriation to meet programmatic needs. Items of note on this agenda include:

- Request to increase appropriation in the amount of \$10 million to the Sheriff's Office to support a contract with MetroHealth for the provision of medical services in the County Jails. The Sheriff's office already has a contract with MetroHealth (totaling \$2,000,000 in 2019) for medical services; the new contract is more comprehensive and gives MetroHealth the responsibility for all medical services, including the hiring and management of all employees. The draw on reserves to support this contract will be partially offset by savings associated with the elimination of positions in the Sheriff's Office (e.g. nurses), anticipated by June 2019. In 2018, nursing personnel costs totaled \$4.9 million.
- o Request to increase appropriation to HHS/Early Childhood to support the repayment of cash advance made from the HHS Levy Fund at the end of 2018 to cover total obligations at the end of the year as required by Ohio Revised Code §5705.36 and to avoid an audit finding. The advance was unexpected as I discussed with Council in the 2018 Results of Operations because OBM had anticipated that the Department would reduce the amount certified on contracts as required by Ohio Revised Code §5705.44, but this did not happen. At the end of 2018, the balance on Early Childhood's encumbrances totaled nearly \$5 million, approximately one-third of the total budget. This far exceeds what was necessary to cover expenses incurred in the current year. OBM had anticipated that the advance would be repaid using appropriation that resulted from decerts processed on the prior year contracts, but to date the Department has only processed \$1.5 million in decerts and has given no indication that more will be processed timely. To ensure that the balance in the HHS Levy Fund is properly restored, OBM seeks to increase the spending authority of Early Childhood.
- Request to increase appropriation to HHS/Senior & Adult Services by \$600,000 to support an expansion of services in the OPTIONS Program, which provides in-home occupational services to support the ability of seniors to remain in their homes. Caseloads have fluctuated between 1,000 and 1,100 this year; the additional funding is anticipated to allow the Department to increase capacity to 1,3000, thereby eliminating the waiting list.
- Request to increase appropriation in the Department of Public Works in the amount of \$1 million to support a \$1.4 million contract for a Planner to assist with the Justice Center project. This contract, originally estimated to total \$500,000, was discussed in the Public Safety Committee meeting this afternoon.

- Request to appropriate various grants awarded to the County for the fellowship program, homeless services, emergency management, and early childhood programming.
- o Request to increase appropriation to HHS/Children and Family Services to hire an *additional* 20 social workers; this is on top of the additional appropriation Council approved on R2019-0006 in the amount of \$686,201 that enabled the Department to hire 20 social workers. Approval of the current request will increase appropriation sufficient to cover 40 new positions. Please note that as of yesterday morning, there were 2,644 children in out of home placement in Cuyahoga County. Of those:
  - 590 were in the County's permanent custody
  - 885 were in kinship placements
  - 917 were placed outside of Cuyahoga County
  - 45 were placed outside of the State of Ohio

WHEREAS, the County Executive, Department of Law and Department of Public Works are recommending that Council approve the proposed Collective Bargaining Agreement for the period 5/1/2018 - 4/30/2021; and,

E. Douglas Beach, PhD, Chief Executive Officer of Western Reserve Area Agency on Aging (WRAAA), has extensive work experience and expertise at the federal, state and local levels with a proven record of outstanding leadership.

In February of 2007, Governor Charlie Crist tapped Dr. Beach as Secretary of the Florida Department of Elder Affairs. Even during very rough economic times, the Department's budget increased with the needs of Florida's seniors. Most of the new funds were used to allow more opportunities for seniors to remain in the community as their healthcare needs increased.

In June of 2010, Dr. Beach became the Executive Director of the Volusia County Council on Aging (COA), one of the premier aging providers in the state. COA provides traditional Older Americans Act (OAA) services, but has also emphasized private pay services and in-home Medicare services.

Dr. Beach became Chief Executive Officer of WRAAA in October 2014. With his blend of skills, business acumen, and respect for the population served by WRAAA, Dr. Beach continues to provide constant leadership and guidance as we face future opportunities and challenges.



WHEREAS, the County Executive/Department of Public Works/Division of County Engineer has recommended approving a Right-of-Way Exhibit as set forth in Plat No. M-5034 for replacement of Memphis Road Bridge 00.62 over CSX railroad in the City of Brooklyn;

WHEREAS, the primary goal of this project is to obtain Council's approval of the right-of-way exhibit and approval of the required acquisitions needed for the Memphis Road Bridge Project over CSX Railroad; and

WHEREAS, special assessments will neither be levied nor collected to pay for any part of the County's costs of said improvement; and

WHEREAS, the project is located in Council District 3; and

WHEREAS, the current estimated project cost is \$500,000.00 and will be funded by County Road & Bridge Funds; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that this Resolution become immediately effective in order that critical services provided by Cuyahoga County can continue and to provide for the usual, daily operation of a County entity.

- **SECTION 3.** That special assessments will neither be levied nor collected to pay for any part of the County's costs of said improvement.
- **SECTION 4.** That all proceedings relative to the Right-of-Way Exhibit are hereby ordered copied into the Road Record of the County by the Department of Public Works and copied into all other proper records of the County by the Fiscal Officer as required by law.

Otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

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









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#### Seeking Authority to Acquire Right-of-Way for the Memphis Road Bridge 00.62 Project





Please note that OBM requested the preparation of the Vehicle CIP in late 2018 – this is the first CIP submitted to Council to review and approve for that division.

**For your review and approval**, attached please find the amended CIP for the Road and Bridge division of Public Works. Please note that the County is only responsible for 22 miles of road within the geographic borders of Cuyahoga County; therefore, not all of this CIP is capitalized as the assets are not the County's.

**For your review and approval**, attached please find the amended CIP for the Sanitary Sewer division of Public Works. Please note that the County is only responsible for the townships and does not own any of the infrastructure. Like Road and Bridge, not all of this CIP is capitalized as the assets are not the County's.

A **Resolution** authorizing the issuance of notto-exceed \$25,000,000.00 Multifamily Housing Mortgage Revenue Bonds, Series 2019 (Hamlet Hills LLC) by the County of Cuyahoga, Ohio, the proceeds of which shall be loaned to Hamlet Hills LLC to (i) refund and retire certain indebtedness incurred to finance the acquisition, renovation, and equipping of a multifamily residential rental housing facility, (ii) finance certain additional capital improvements, (iii) fund certain working capital needs for the hereinafter defined Borrower, (iv) fund interest reserve funds, and (v) pay all or a portion of the costs of issuing such bonds; providing for the pledge of revenues for the payment of such Bonds; authorizing a Loan Agreement and Trust Indenture appropriate for the protection and disposition of such revenues and to further secure such Bonds; authorizing a Tax Regulatory Agreement and a Land Use Restriction Agreement; authorizing other actions in connection with the issuance of such Bonds; rescinding Resolution No. R2018-0217 dated 11/13/2018; and declaring the necessity that this Resolution become immediately effective.

WHEREAS, the County of Cuyahoga, Ohio (the "Issuer"), by virtue of the laws of the State of Ohio, including Article VIII, Section 16 of the Constitution of Ohio, and Section 133.51 of the Ohio Revised Code, is authorized and empowered among other things (a) to make a loan to assist in the financing and refinancing of the acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping of housing facilities within the boundaries of the Issuer, (b) to issue and sell its revenue bonds to provide moneys for such loans and (c) to enact this resolution (this "Bond Legislation") and execute and deliver the agreements and instruments hereinafter identified; and

WHEREAS, this Council (the "Issuing Authority") has been presented with a proposal by Hamlet Hills LLC, an Ohio limited liability company (the "Borrower"), with

respect to the refinancing of a certain 138-unit multifamily residential rental housing facility located in Chagrin Falls, Ohio (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the sole member of the Borrower is Hamlet Operator Holding LLC, an Ohio nonprofit limited liability company, the sole member of Hamlet Operator Holding LLC is AE Hamlet Holding LLC, an Ohio nonprofit limited liability company, and the sole member of AE Hamlet Holding LLC is American Eagle LifeCare Corporation, a Tennessee nonprofit corporation and an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended; and

WHEREAS, the Issuing Authority has determined, based solely upon representations of the Borrower, and does hereby confirm that the refunding and retirement of certain indebtedness previously incurred to finance the acquisition, renovation and equipping of the Project (the "Prior Indebtedness"), the funding of certain capital improvements to the Project, the funding of certain working capital needs of the Borrower, the funding of interest reserve funds, and the paying of all or a portion of the costs of issuing such bonds, will promote the welfare of the people of the Issuer and the State of Ohio, provide residential rental housing to the benefit of the people of the Issuer, and that the Issuer, by assisting with the financing of the Project through the issuance of revenue bonds in the aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$25,000,000 to be designated Multifamily Housing Mortgage Revenue Bonds, Series 2019 (Hamlet Hills LLC), or such other designation as provided in the hereinafter defined Indenture, consisting of Multifamily Housing Mortgage Revenue Bonds, Tax-Exempt Series 2019A, Multifamily Housing Mortgage Revenue Bonds, Taxable Series 2019B (collectively, the "Bonds"), will be acting in the manner consistent with and in furtherance of the provisions of Article VIII, Section 16 of the Constitution of the State of Ohio, and the laws of the State of Ohio, particularly Section 133.51 of the Ohio Revised Code (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, the Issuing Authority expects to sell all of the Bonds to First Midwest Bank, or an affiliate thereof (the "Initial Purchaser"), pursuant to the Indenture; and

WHEREAS, proposed forms of the following documents have been presented to the Issuer for approval in connection with the issuance, sale, and delivery of the Bonds:

- 1. Trust Indenture (the "Indenture") between the Issuer and UMB Bank, N.A. and its successors in trust, as trustee (the "Trustee"), with respect to the proposed Bonds, including the proposed form of the Bonds;
- 2. Loan Agreement (the "Loan Agreement") between the Issuer and the Borrower, with respect to the Bonds;
- 3. Tax Regulatory Agreement and No-Arbitrage Certificate (the "Tax Regulatory Agreement") among the Issuer, the Borrower, American Eagle LifeCare Corporation, Hamlet Operator Holding LLC, AE Hamlet Holding LLC and the Trustee; and

4. Land Use Restriction Agreement (the "Land Use Restriction Agreement") among the Issuer, the Borrower, American Eagle LifeCare Corporation and the Trustee.

WHEREAS, in accordance with the applicable provisions of the Act, the Issuer proposes to enter into the Indenture, the Loan Agreement, the Tax Regulatory Agreement, and the Land Use Restriction Agreement (collectively, the "Issuer Documents");

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF CUYAHOGA COUNTY, OHIO:

**SECTION 1.** <u>Definitions</u>. All defined terms used herein and not otherwise defined herein shall have the respective meanings given to them in the Indenture.

Any reference herein to the Issuer or the Issuing Authority, or to any officers or members thereof, shall include those which succeed to their functions, duties or responsibilities pursuant to or by operation of law or who are lawfully performing their functions.

Unless the context shall otherwise indicate, words importing the singular number shall include the plural number, and vice versa, and the terms "hereof," "hereby," "hereto," "hereunder," and similar terms, mean this Bond Legislation.

**SECTION 2.** <u>Determination of Issuer.</u> Pursuant to Section 133.51 of the Act, this Issuing Authority hereby finds and determines, based solely upon representations of the Borrower and the advice of Bond Counsel, that the Project to be refinanced with the proceeds of the Bonds through the refunding and retirement of the Prior Indebtedness, the financing of certain capital improvements to the Project and the funding of certain working capital needs of the Borrower is consistent with the provisions of Section 16 of Article VIII, Ohio Constitution.

**SECTION 3.** <u>Authorization of Bonds</u>. It is hereby determined to be necessary to, and the Issuer shall, issue, sell and deliver, as provided herein and pursuant to the authority of the Act, the Bonds for the purpose of (i) refunding and retiring the Prior Indebtedness which financed the acquisition, renovation and equipping of the Project, (ii) financing the acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping of certain capital improvements to the Project, (iii) funding certain working capital needs of the Borrower, (iv) funding interest reserve funds, and (v) paying all or a portion of the costs of issuing the Bonds, all in accordance with the provisions of the Loan Agreement. The maximum amount of all Bonds to be outstanding at any one time is not to exceed \$25,000,000.

**SECTION 4.** <u>Terms and Execution of the Bonds</u>. The Bonds shall be designated, shall be issued in the forms and denominations, shall be numbered, dated and payable as provided in the Indenture. The Bonds shall mature as provided in the Indenture, and have such terms, bear such interest, and be subject to mandatory and optional redemption as provided in the Indenture. The Bonds shall initially bear interest

at a variable rate at a weighted average interest rate not to exceed 7.00% per annum (subject to the Maximum Rate as defined in the Indenture) and shall mature over a period not to exceed 38 years. The Bonds shall be executed on behalf of the Issuer by the manual or facsimile signature of the County Executive or designee and, if determined by the Issuer to be appropriate, the Fiscal Officer of the Issuer. In case any officer whose signature or a facsimile thereof shall appear on the Bonds shall cease to be such officer before the issuance or delivery of the Bonds, such signature or facsimile thereof shall nevertheless be valid and sufficient for all purposes, the same as if he had remained in office until after that time.

The form of the Bonds submitted to the Issuer, subject to appropriate insertions and revisions in order to comply with the provisions of the Indenture, is hereby approved, and when the same shall be executed on behalf of the Issuer by the appropriate officers thereof in the manner contemplated hereby and by the Indenture, in aggregate principal amounts not to exceed \$25,000,000, shall represent the approved form of Bonds of the Issuer.

The Bonds initially shall be issued only in fully registered form as described in the Indenture.

**SECTION 5.** Sale of the Bonds. In accordance with a request of the Borrower that the sale of the Bonds be made privately upon a negotiated basis, the Bonds are hereby awarded to the Initial Purchaser at the purchase price set forth, and on the terms and conditions described in, the Indenture. The County Executive, the Fiscal Officer, the Director of Law or the Clerk of the Issuing Authority each are hereby separately authorized and directed to make on behalf of the Issuer the necessary arrangements to establish the dates, location, procedures and conditions for the delivery of the Bonds to or at the order of the Initial Purchaser and to take all steps necessary to effect due execution and delivery to or at the order of the Initial Purchaser (or temporary bonds delivered in lieu of definitive Bonds until their preparation and delivery can be effectuated) under the terms of this Bond Legislation, the Loan Agreement and the Indenture. It is hereby determined that the prices for and the terms of the Bonds, and the sale thereof, all as provided in the aforesaid documents, are in compliance with all legal requirements.

SECTION 6. <u>Arbitrage Provisions</u>. The Issuer covenants in the Loan Agreement that it will require the Borrower to restrict the use of the proceeds of the Bonds in such manner and to such extent, if any, as may be necessary, after taking into account reasonable expectations at the times the Bonds are delivered to the Initial Purchaser so that they will not constitute arbitrage bonds under Section 148 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"). The Fiscal Officer or any other officer having responsibility with respect to the issuance of the Bonds, is authorized and directed, alone or in conjunction with any other officer, employee, consultant or agent of the Issuer, to deliver certificates prepared by Bond Counsel and approved by the Issuer's counsel, based upon representations of the Borrower, as provided in such certificates, for inclusion in the transcripts of proceedings for the Bonds, setting forth the facts, estimates and

circumstances and reasonable expectations pertaining to said Section 148 and regulations thereunder, all as of the date of delivery of and payment for the Bonds.

**SECTION 7.** Authorization of Issuer Documents and All Other Documents to be Executed by the Issuer. In order to better secure the payment of the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds as the same shall become due and payable, the County Executive is authorized and directed to execute, acknowledge and deliver in the name and on behalf of the Issuer, the Issuer Documents in substantially the forms submitted to the Issuer, which are hereby approved, with such changes therein not inconsistent with this Bond Legislation and not substantially adverse to the Issuer as may be permitted by the Act and approved by the officer executing the same on behalf of the Issuer. The approval of such changes by said officer, and that such are not substantially adverse to the Issuer, shall be conclusively evidenced by the execution of such Issuer Documents by such officer.

The Issuer has not confirmed, and assumes no responsibility for the accuracy, sufficiency or fairness of any statements in any reports, financial information, disclosure documents or other information relating to the Bonds, the Initial Purchaser, the Project or the Borrower, or any other documents, or the history, businesses, properties, organization, management, financial condition, market area or any other matter relating to the Borrower.

The County Executive, the Fiscal Officer, the Director of Law, the Clerk of the County Council and/or their respective designees are each hereby separately authorized to take any and all actions and to execute such financing statements, assignments, certificates and other instruments that may be necessary or appropriate in the opinion of Dinsmore & Shohl LLP, as Bond Counsel, in order to effect the issuance of the Bonds and the intent of this Bond Legislation. The Clerk of the Issuing Authority, or other appropriate officer of the Issuer, shall certify a true transcript of all proceedings had with respect to the issuance of the Bonds along with such information from the records of the Issuer as is necessary to determine the regularity and validity of the issuance of the Bonds. The Fiscal Officer or other appropriate officer of the Issuer is authorized to collect and receive, on behalf of the Issuer, application, administrative and related fees in connection with the issuance of the Bonds.

**SECTION 8.** <u>Covenants of Issuer</u>. In addition to other covenants of the Issuer in this Bond Legislation, the Issuer further covenants and agrees as follows:

- (a) <u>Payment of Principal, Premium and Interest</u>. The Issuer will, solely from the sources herein or in the Indenture provided, pay or cause to be paid the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on each and all Bonds on the dates, at the places and in the manner provided herein, in the Indenture and in the Bonds.
- (b) <u>Performance of Covenants, Authority and Actions</u>. The Issuer will at all times faithfully observe and perform all agreements, covenants, undertakings, stipulations and provisions contained in the Bonds and the Issuer Documents, and in all proceedings of the Issuer pertaining to the Bonds. The Issuer warrants and covenants that

it is, and upon delivery of the Bonds will be, duly authorized by the laws of the State of Ohio, including particularly and without limitation the Act, to issue the Bonds and to execute the related Issuer Documents and all other documents to be executed by it, to provide for the security for payment of the principal of, premium, if any, and interest on the Bonds in the manner and to the extent herein and in the Indenture set forth; that all actions on its part for the issuance of the Bonds and execution and delivery of the Issuer Documents and all other documents to be executed by it in connection with the issuance of the Bonds, have been or will be duly and effectively taken; and that the Bonds will be valid and enforceable special obligations of the Issuer according to the terms thereof. Each provision of the Bond Legislation, the Issuer Documents and each Bond, and all other documents to be executed by the Issuer in connection with the issuance of the Bonds, is binding upon each officer of the Issuer as may from time to time have the authority under law to take such actions as may be necessary to perform all or any part of the duty required by such provision; and each duty of the Issuer and of its officers and employees undertaken pursuant to such proceedings for the Bonds is established as a duty of the Issuer and of each such officer and employee having authority to perform such duty, specifically enjoined by law and resulting from an office, trust or station within the meaning of Section 2731.01 of the Ohio Revised Code, providing for enforcement by writ of mandamus.

SECTION 9. No Personal Liability. No recourse under or upon any obligation, covenant, acceptance or agreement contained in this Bond Legislation, or in any Bond, or in the Issuer Documents, or under any judgment obtained against the Issuer or by the enforcement of any assessment or by any legal or equitable proceeding by virtue of any constitution or statute or otherwise, or under any circumstances, shall be had against any officer as such, past, present, or future, of the Issuer, either directly or through the Issuer, or otherwise, for the payment for or to the Issuer or any receiver thereof, or for or to any holder of any Bond, or otherwise, of any sum that may be due and unpaid by the Issuer upon any of the Bonds. Any and all personal liability of every nature, whether at common law or in equity, or by statute or by constitution or otherwise, of any such officer, as such, to respond by reason of any act or omission on his or her part, or otherwise, for, directly or indirectly, the payment for or to the Issuer or any receiver thereof, or for or to the owner or any holder of any Bond, or otherwise, of any sum that may remain due and unpaid upon any Bond, shall be deemed to be expressly waived and released as a condition of and consideration for the execution and delivery of the Issuer Documents and the issuance of the Bonds.

**SECTION 10.** No Debt or Tax Pledge. Neither the Bonds nor any of the Issuer Documents constitute an indebtedness or pledge of the faith and credit or taxing powers of the Issuer within the meaning of the Constitution of the State of Ohio. The Bonds shall be payable solely from the revenues and security interests pledged for their payment as provided in the Indenture, and neither moneys raised by taxation nor any other general or special revenues of the Issuer shall be obligated or pledged for the payment of principal of, premium (if any) or interest on the Bonds, and each Bond shall contain on the face thereof a statement to that effect and to the effect that the Bonds shall be paid solely from the revenues received by the Issuer pursuant to the Loan Agreement and in accordance with the Indenture.

**SECTION 11.** <u>Severability</u>. If any section, paragraph or provision of this Bond Legislation shall be held to be invalid or unenforceable for any reason, the invalidity or unenforceability of such section, paragraph or provision shall not affect any of the remaining provisions of this Bond Legislation.

**SECTION 12.** <u>Sunshine Law.</u> This Issuing Authority hereby finds and determines that all formal actions relative to the adoption of this Bond Legislation were taken in open meetings of this Issuing Authority, and that all deliberations of this Issuing Authority and of its committees, if any, which resulted in formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in full compliance with applicable legal requirements, including Section 121.22, Ohio Revised Code.

**SECTION 13.** Retention of Counsel. This Issuing Authority hereby retains the legal services of Dinsmore & Shohl LLP as Bond Counsel to the Issuer and Tucker Ellis LLP as special counsel to the Issuer, each in connection with the authorization, sale, issuance and delivery of the Bonds, pursuant to the authority in Ohio Revised Code Section 133.51; provided, that any fees and charges of such firms for the provision of such services shall be payable solely from the proceeds of the Bonds or funds otherwise made available by the Borrower, and the Issuer shall not have any responsibility for the payment of any of those fees and charges. In providing those legal services, as independent contractors and in attorney-client relationships, such counsel shall not exercise any administrative discretion on behalf of the Issuer in the formulation of public policy, expenditure of public funds, enforcement of laws, rules and regulations of the State, or of the Issuer, or of any other political subdivision of the State, or the execution of public trusts.

**SECTION 14.** Repeal of Prior Bond Legislation. This Issuing Authority has previously adopted Resolution No. R2018-0217, adopted November 13, 2018, authorizing the issuance of revenue bonds of the Issuing Authority for the benefit of the Borrower (the "Prior Bond Legislation"). The Prior Bond Legislation is hereby repealed in its entirety.

**SECTION 15.** Effective Date. It is necessary that this Bond Legislation become immediately effective for the usual daily operation of the Issuer; the preservation of public peace, health, or safety in the Issuer; and any additional reasons set forth in the preamble. Provided that this Bond Legislation receives the affirmative vote of at least eight members of Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon the earliest occurrence of any of the following: (i) its approval by the County Executive through signature, (ii) the expiration of the time during which it may be disapproved by the County Executive under Section 3.10(6) of the Charter, or (iii) its passage by at least eight members of Council after disapproval pursuant to Section 3.10(7) of the Charter. Otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

### **Ordinance No. O2019-0007**

WHEREAS, Section 403.05(A) of the Cuyahoga County Code prohibits employees from participating in any decision specifically to appoint, hire, promote, discipline, or discharge a relative for any position of the County; and

WHEREAS Section 403.05(B) of the Cuyahoga County Code prohibits employees from supervising a relative in the performance of the relative's powers and duties; and

WHEREAS, Section 402.01(L) defines "relative" to mean "an individual's spouse, domestic partner, parent, grandparent step-parent, sibling, step-sibling, sibling's spouse, child, grandchild, step-child, uncle, aunt, nephew, niece, first cousin, or household member, and persons having any of these relationships to the spouse or domestic partner of said individual;" and

WHEREAS, this prohibition has resulted in circumstances that unduly precluded highly qualified candidates from holding certain positions where the potential for favoritism or conflict of interest is remote; and

WHEREAS, the definition of "relative" in the current code of ethics is broader than the Ohio Ethics Commission's definition of "family member" for nepotism; and

WHEREAS, with the adoption of this amendment, the County's code of ethics remains more expansive than the Ohio Ethics Commission's standards for nepotism; and

WHEREAS, it is necessary that this Ordinance become immediately effective in order that critical services provided by Cuyahoga County can continue and to provide for the usual, daily operation of a County entity.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF CUYAHOGA COUNTY, OHIO:

**SECTION 1.** Section 402.02(L) of the Cuyahoga County Code is hereby amended to read as follows (additions are bolded and underlined, deletions are stricken):

L. "Relative" shall mean an individual's spouse, domestic partner, parent, grandparent, step-parent, sibling, step-sibling, sibling's spouse, child, grandchild, step-child, uncle, aunt, nephew, niece, first cousin, or household member, and persons having any of these relationships to a parent, grandparent, step-parent, sibling, step-sibling, sibling's spouse, child, grandchild, or step-child of the spouse or domestic partner of said individual.

**SECTION 2.** It is necessary that this Ordinance become immediately effective for the usual daily operation of the County and the reasons set forth in the preamble. Provided that this Ordinance receives the affirmative vote of at least eight members of Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon the earliest occurrence of any of the following: (1) its approval by the County Executive through signature, (2) the expiration of the time during which it may be disapproved by the County Executive under Section 3.10(6) of the Cuyahoga County Charter, or (3) its passage by at least eight members of Council after disapproval pursuant to Section 3.10(7) of the Cuyahoga County Charter. Otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law.

**SECTION 3.** It is found and determined that all formal actions of this Council relating to the adoption of this Ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of the Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

WHEREAS, the County Executive/Department of Sustainability has recommended bicycle and scooter share licensing to ensure accountability, reliability, and safety in Cuyahoga County's bicycle and scooter share network; and

WHEREAS, the purpose is to regulate dockless bike and scooter share operators in the County.

# NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ENACTED BY THE COUNTY COUNCIL OF CUYAHOGA COUNTY, OHIO:

**SECTION 1.** Chapter 1303 of the Cuyahoga County Code is hereby enacted to read as follows:

#### **Chapter 1303: Bicycle and Scooter Share Licensing**

#### **Section 1303.01**

#### (A) As used in this Chapter:

"Bicycle and Scooter Share Program" means a transportation program within Cuyahoga County that allows users to rent bicycles, scooters, and other modes of transportation that do not require a state license for operation for point-to-point trips.

"Bicycle and Scooter Share Company" means an entity licensed to do business in the State of Ohio that operates a Bicycle and Scooter Share program.

(B) The Cuyahoga County Department of Sustainability may issue a Bicycle and Scooter Share license and charge a license fee and per trip fee to entities that apply for a license issued in accordance with rules adopted under this chapter. The term of any license issued under this chapter shall be set by the Cuyahoga County Department of Sustainability and shall not exceed five years commencing on the date of issuance. Approval of such licenses shall not be subject to the requirements

- of Chapter 501 of this Code. The Director of Sustainability may place a cap on the total number of licenses issued prior to December 31, 2020.
- (C) The Director of Sustainability shall adopt rules and a fee schedule in accordance with Chapter 113 of the Cuyahoga County Code for purposes of maintaining an orderly Bicycle and Scooter Share network within Cuyahoga County, issuing licenses to Bicycle and Scooter Share companies, and setting a license fee and per trip fee.
- (D) Any Bicycle or Scooter Share Company that receives a license under this chapter and either violates the terms of the license or fails to pay the fees established under this Chapter may have their license revoked. No entity shall operate a Bicycle and Scooter Share company in Cuyahoga County without a valid license issued under this Chapter. Any entity that operates a Bicycle and Scooter Share Company in Cuyahoga County without a license issued under this chapter shall be fined an amount equal to twice the current cost of a license, determined as of the date of the citation, as established in the fee schedule adopted under this chapter. The Director of Sustainability may deny issuing a license to any entity that has previously received a license and violated the terms of that license. The Director of Law may, on behalf of the County Executive, bring civil enforcement action to collect any fines or fees due under this Chapter.
- (E) The Director of Sustainability may enter into agreements with municipalities within Cuyahoga County to expand Bicycle and Scooter Share operations throughout the County and to distribute or direct payment of the per trip fees collected to the municipalities in accordance with the rules adopted pursuant to this Chapter.
- (F) All monies remitted directly to Cuyahoga County shall be deposited into the Bicycle and Scooter Share Fund established pursuant to Chapter 723 of this Code.

**SECTION 2.** Chapter 723 of the Cuyahoga County Code is hereby enacted as follows:

#### Chapter 723: Bicycle and Scooter Share Fund

#### Section 723.01 Bicycle and Scooter Share Fund Established

(A) There is hereby established the Bicycle and Scooter Share Fund. The Director of Sustainability shall be responsible for the administration of the Fund in accordance with the Contract and Purchasing Procedures as codified in Chapter 501 of this Code. The Bicycle and Scooter Share Fund may be used to pay costs of, or reimbursement for, the cost of administering Bicycle and Scooter Share licensing, for improvements to Cuyahoga County's bicycle and scooter share infrastructure, and to distribute the per trip fee with municipalities that enter an agreement pursuant to Chapter 1303.
